A Vandalic Action. The constitutional convention adopted a bill of rights to-day. The following section was adopted unanimously: "The people of this State accept as final the establishment of the right of trial by jury in all cases where there can be no accession of any State."

Indicted for Conspiracy to Defraud. St. Louis, Sept. 17.—The Republican learns that Gen. John McDowell, ex-external revenue supervisor, and Col.
