

NEW MARRIAGE LICENSE FORM

Expected Here Shortly—More Work for the Clerk

Just as soon as a supply of the new marriage license forms provided for by a recent law of the Legislature are received here they will be issued, was the announcement of City Clerk Rauch of the Marriage License Bureau this morning.

The chief advantage of the new form is that the clergyman who performs the marriage ceremony is able to see at a glance the full particulars of the contracting parties. All the questions asked by the clerk of the bride and bridegroom are incorporated in the license.

Formerly the answers recorded were kept in the city clerk's record. The new license is also in the form of an affidavit and will mean more work for the clerk.

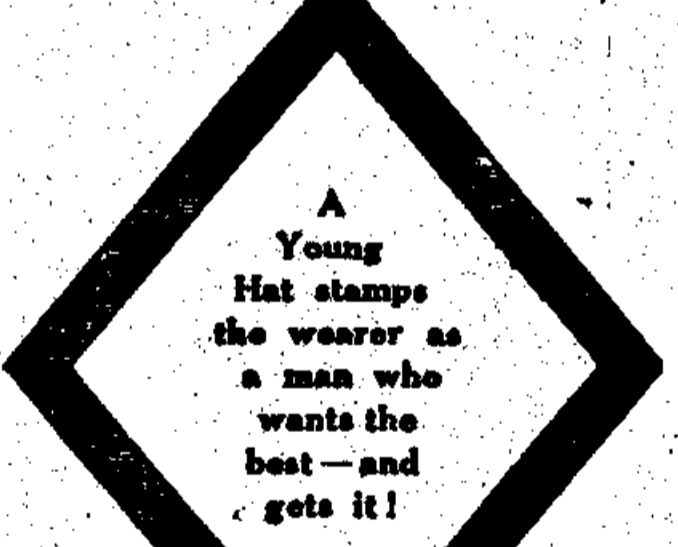

TRANSFERS HOLDING TO SALMON RIVER CO.

Redfield and Orwell Parcels Included in Monster Deed

A deed in book form, transferring all the Oswego county holdings of Fred D. Corey of Buffalo to the Salmon River Power company of Orwell, was filed in the County Clerk's office today. It is one of the largest in point of contents ever filed in the clerk's office, making a volume of 57 pages. In all 49 parcels, all located in Redfield and Orwell, are transferred by Mr. Corey to the company. Only a nominal consideration is given as the property was bought up by Mr. Corey as a representative of the Niagara power interests that control the Salmon River company.

Hundreds of acres are included in the deed, covering the property to be devoted to reservoir and dam purposes at Stillwater and northward into Redfield and including much of the village of Redfield Square. The filing of the deed means that the work of development will be started in real earnest at once. Many of the farms were sold on condition that the former owner might raise and harvest 1912 crops.
