RIGHT OF STUDENTS TO VOTE. The February number of the Western Jurist publishes a lengthy opinion of the supreme court of Illinois, in a contested election case, of the right of students and others to vote. Section 9 is as follows: Students attending college from distant parts of the state and from other states, paying no taxes on their property, and taking no part in the affairs of the town, and who do not remain in town to attend their college course is completed, those who voluntarily stay on the other hand, those who enter freely from without, and who are engaged in business as their home, having no other right to reside in case of sickness or domestic affliction, are entitled to vote. It is pro here for the benefit of such students in the sense of the statute.

WILKES BOOTH. Mr. Morrison disclaims responsibility for the appointment of "Wilkes Booth" Hamilton as Clerk of his Committee. He says Senator Gordon and Speaker Kerr pressed his appointment so warmly that he yielded his own preference. So the Speaker of the House himself interceded himself in pushing this scoundrel. Mr. Morrison does not improve matters much by his explanation. He only shows that the flower of the democratic party in the Senate and in the House were before in the service of one of the vilest characters of the time, whose career was known to the southern members at least.

OLD FROG. The honor paid to General Myers by the International Geographic Society for the support of the Geographic Service Bureau was well deserved. Europe has nothing to equal it. The London Times publishes a small daily map of the meteorological condition of the British Isles and the continental coast from Finisterre to the southern coast of Norway. The report is dated 6 P. M. the previous evening, and is followed by a scientific description of the weather for the previous twenty-four hours. No attempt at prediction is made, and it would be of little use if it were. The American system is far from perfect, but with all its imperfections there is nothing quite like it anywhere else, and the "probabilities" of what it will be are quite as promising as anything it has already accomplished.

THE NORTHERN PACIFIC. The bankrupt Northern Pacific Railroad Company has obtained a judgment of \$3,500,000 from the legislature of Montana territory. The original petition of the company was an unconditional gift of \$2,000,000, but the legislature made it a million and a half more on condition that enough additional money be raised elsewhere to finish the road. Vice President Stark is now on his way to New York to raise a loan of \$9,000,000 for that purpose. There are now 480 miles of track laid on the eastern division, from Duluth to Bismark, and 105 miles on the Pacific end, from Pudget Sound to the Columbia River, leaving a distance yet to be covered between these points of 800 miles. It is not likely to encourage investors in this unfortunate road, is that 200 of the 480 miles between Duluth and Bismark have not been operated this winter, on account of the frequent snow-blockades.
