OBITUARY.

Charles F. Vauvillier, formerly of Oswego, died Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Harriet Beech at Iilon. Mr. Vauvillier was a member of Company A, 147th Regiment, New York Volunteers. His remains will arrive here at 12:15 p. m. to-morrow and burial will be in Rural cemetery. Many friends will be pained to learn of his death.

Mr. Vauvillier was a cooper by trade and for a great many years he was employed at Kingsford's. He has lived in Iilon for the past five years. He served throughout the war and was wounded at Hatch's Run, Va., with Captain David Welsh of this city.

Holla Meeker.

Word has been received here announcing the death of Holla Meeker at Monticello, Ohio. Mr. Meeker was born in Oswego, later moving to Ohio. He served during the Civil War in an Ohio regiment and received wounds at Kenesaw Mountain that he never recovered from and which finally caused his death. He was buried at Toledo. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. D. C. Farnham of this city and one brother, Holivar Meeker, of Portland, Me.

ONEY ISLAND FIVE CENT FARE KILLED.

Measure Sent to Railroad Committee for Burial.

ALBANY, Feb. 18.—The Assembly this afternoon killed the Oney Island five cent fare bill by recommending it, by a party vote, to the Railroad Committee. This is a victory for the supporters of the public service commission law, as it was contended that the matter should have been referred to the commission of the first district.

Billiard Champion's Great Work.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Calvin Demarest, the national amateur billiard champion, repeated his great performance of Friday night by averaging 30 4-11 at Mussey's last night, in the fifth game of his 14 2-balk line match with E. J. Clark. The score was 400 to 35. The young champion ran his 400 points in eleven innings just as he did Friday night, but unlike the first performance, he got two goose eggs successively in his fifth and sixth innings. He got going with a vengeance in his seventh session, however, running 63 and coming back in the next inning with 98.

COLONEL BRUSH PROMOTED.

Commander of 24th Regiment Takes Place of Gen. Davis, Retired-Col. Paulding Succeeds Brush.

General C. E. L. B. Davis retired from active service Saturday, and the vacancy created was immediately filled by the advancement of Col. Daniel H. Brush, 24th Infantry, whose regiment sailed from Manila Saturday under orders to take post at Madison barracks and Fort Ontario and relieve detachments of the 5th and 12th Infantry, which have been garrisoning posts since the departure of the 23rd Infantry.

Gen. Davis was promoted from Colonel Jan. 27. He entered the military academy in 1862, appointed from Connecticut, and was graduated third in the class of 1866. He was assigned to the engineers, became a first lieutenant in 1867, Captain in 1877, Major in 1888, Lieutenant-Colonel in 1901 and Colonel in 1905.

Gen. Brush is a native of Illinois, nearly 60 years old, and has been in the army since a youngster of 16 in 1864. He began as a private in the 154th Illinois volunteers. Upon graduation from West Point in 1871 he was assigned to the 17th Infantry. He became a first lieutenant in 1876, captain in 1882, major in 1901, lieutenant-colonel in 1903 and colonel last May. During the Santiago campaign, he commanded a battalion of the 17th Infantry, and upon being promoted major was transferred to the 25th Infantry. As a lieutenant-colonel he served with the 11th Infantry, and since promotion to colonel has been in command of the 24th Infantry.

Gen. Davis' retirement and Gen. Brush's advancement has the effect of promoting Lieut. Col. William Paulding, 18th Infantry, to Colonel and the command of the 24th Infantry. Col. Paulding is now in the Philippines, and Lieut. Col. Ammon A. Augur is temporarily in command of the 24th. Col. Paulding will probably not join the Regiment until after its arrival here at its new home posts. Maj. W. A. Nichols, 1st Infantry, and Capt. T. W. Moore and Lieut. T. L. Brewer, 21st Infantry, are also raised in rank.

Col. Paulding entered the army from Civil life in 1873. He is a son of New York, and began his career as a second lieutenant of the 19th Infantry. In 1882 he was promoted first lieutenant, but remained with the regiment, and in 1892 was promoted captain. As a major, which rank came in 1901, he was assigned to the 3d Infantry, from which he was transferred to the 18th Infantry in 1903, and he became lieutenant-colonel of the regiment in 1904.

Y., Feb. 18.—The first race of a series between a scooter of the Patchogue Scooter club and ice boats of the Orange Lake Ice Yacht club was sailed on Orange lake and resulted in a victory for the scooter. By the terms of the race the ice boats had to sail twenty laps while the scooter was sailing ten. Commodore Tiburter entered the scooter Eagle, and Commodore Higginson entered the ice yacht Windward.

Racket Tourney at Boston.

BOSTON, Feb. 18.—A week's tournament for the national racket championship was opened at the Tennis and Racket club here with players from New York, Chicago and Philadelphia. The feature of the matches was the defeat of A. P. Osborne of Boston in four long sets by W. P. Burdell of New York. H. Fincke of New York, the present champion, won his match with G. A. Thorpe of Chicago after a spirited contest.

Cleveland Auto Show Opens.

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 18.—Cleveland's annual automobile show was opened at 7 o'clock last night at the Central armory with 200 big cars of the 1908 models on exhibition. Ten thousand electric lights constituted the illumination, while the building was decorated in yellow and white bunting. As usual, society was out in its best clothes to add lustre to the polished horseless carriages.

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—A new world's record for trotting on the ice was recorded in the free for all at the Yborpark park races here when in the first heat Dave K. came home in 2:16. This is a second time a quarter better than the previous record, made last year at Ottawa by Phoebe W.

Ten Teams in Boston Bike Grand.

BOSTON, Feb. 18.—Ten teams made up of leading professional bicycle riders started last night in a six day's race at the Park Square Coliseum. The riding will occupy two and a half hours each evening, with the exception of Saturday, when racing will continue from 2 p. m. until 10 p. m.

Pole at New Britain.

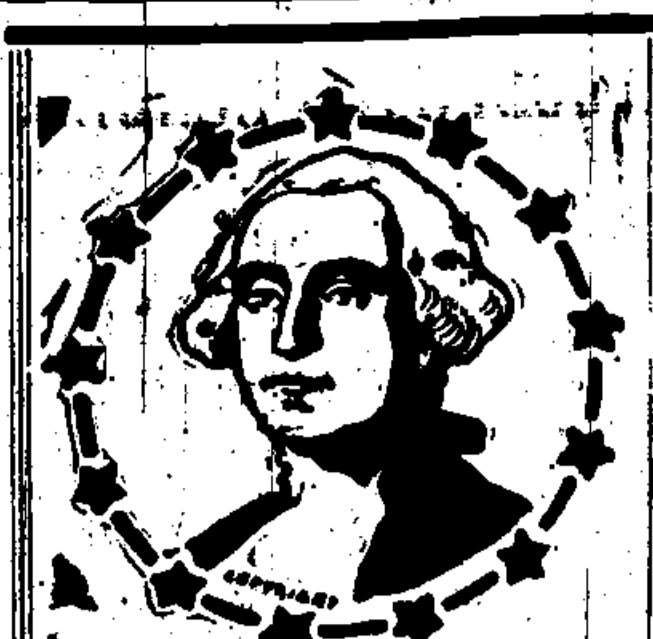

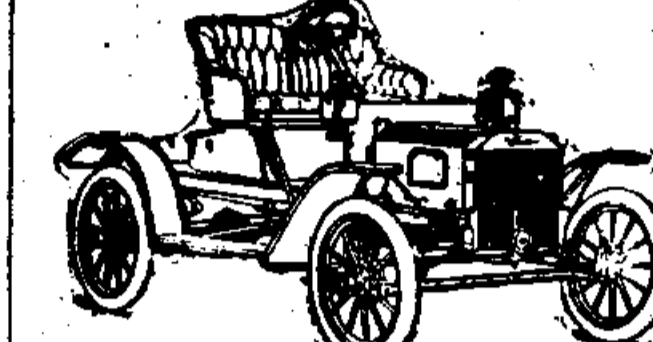
