

IMPRESSIVE FUNERAL OF FR. AUGER.

Immense Crowd Attended Solemn Services at St. Louis' Church.

MANY PRIESTS PRESENT

Guard of Honor Will Keep Silent Watch Over Body until It Is Laid Away at St. Peter's—Eloquent Sermon Delivered.

St. Louis Church was filled to overflowing this morning with a sorrowing throng gathered to pay a last loving tribute to the memory of its deceased pastor, the Rev. J. J. Auger.

The church was draped in mourning the Bishop's colors, purple, being intertwined with the black and white. The altar was also hung with purple as was the Bishop's throne located on the gospel side of the altar.

Over twenty priests were present at the obsequies including the Rt. Rev. P. A. Ludden, Bishop of Syracuse; Monsignor J. M. S. Lynch of Utica, and the Very Rev. Dr. Lewis M. Miller, O. M. C. Provincial of the Franciscans.

The services began with the reading of the office for the dead in which all the attending priests participated, the chanters being the Rev. Fathers Henry Reuland and William F. Dougherty of Syracuse. Following this came the celebration of a solemn mass of requiem of which Father Hopkins was celebrant, Rev. P. A. Robillard of Albany, deacon, Rev. Father Heister of Oswego, sub-deacon and Rev. Father Lindeman of Oswego, master of ceremonies.

SUCCEEDS FATHER FOY

Rev. Ambrose M. Dwyer of St. John's Cathedral, Syracuse, Will Assume Pastorate at Lestershire.

This morning's Syracuse Standard says: Rev. Bishop Ludden notified Rev. Ambrose M. Dwyer yesterday morning to assume the pastorate of St. James Church, Lestershire. He will succeed Rev. James P. Foy, who died at the place last Saturday and whose funeral was held yesterday morning. Lestershire is four miles from Binghamton.

The departure of Father Dwyer from St. John's Cathedral in this city will be regretted by the congregation with which he has been connected for the past nine years. He was one of the indefatigable workers in the ranks of the clergy in this city and all the large fairs in recent years conducted at the cathedral were directed by him successfully.

His appointment is a promotion and is a recognition of his ability. Lestershire is a recently established parish and Father Dwyer will have an ample field for his energy and skill in organization there.

NEW MAYOR GRABS THE HEALTH BOARD.

Ignores Appointments Made by County Judge and Makes New Ones.

THE LAW VIOLATED.

No Practicing Physician on Board as Required—Appoints His Successor Without Taking Trouble to Re-sign—Prospect for Better Water Service Bright.

Mayor Mansfield has refused to recognize the appointments of George W. Bush, Carl Daus and H. H. Roder to the Board of Health recently made by County Judge Stowell and at a meeting of the Common Council last night the complexion of the Board was changed from Republican to Democratic.

The reason for making the change is to make room for Frank Dowdle who wants to succeed W. J. Dempsey as Health Inspector. County Judge Stowell's appointments were made during December and he acted under a law which provides that in the event of the failure of the city officers to name members of the Department of Health the County Judge shall appoint them.

Mayor Baker attempted to fill vacancies in the Board but the Council held them up and then Judge Stowell stepped in and made the appointments already referred to. He is backed up by the law and any effort to retire Mr. Dempsey in the manner contemplated will be fought to the bitter end.

The excuse given by the Mayor for making the appointments was that he deemed the appointments made by the County Judge illegal and of no effect and he thereupon announced the following new members: Byron D. Houghton to succeed Dr. L. E. Shepherd, deceased; Herman Schulz to succeed Carl Daus; William Galvin to succeed himself and Joseph Barry to succeed J. E. Mansfield.

Alderman Carroll offered a resolution confirming the appointments and the seven Democratic Councilmen voted in the affirmative. Alderman Smith opposed. The Board of Health consists of five Democrats: Messrs. Houghton, Barry, Schulz, Galvin and Gleason. The Republican members are Karl Kellogg and Joshua Reed.

Several very important legal questions have been raised in connection with Mayor Mansfield's appointments. In the first place he announced the appointment of Joseph Barry to succeed himself (Mansfield) the charter requires that an officer should resign before his successor can be appointed except in case of death, etc. The new Mayor did not go to this trouble at least his resignation has not been filed.

It looks very much as if he were trying to get two Democrats into one place which is quite different even if unavailing from getting one Democrat into two places—at La Balguy. The law requires that at least one of the members of the Board of Health shall be a practicing physician. This provision has been violated as no physician is now a member of the Board.

Judge Stowell said to-day he was too busy to discuss the matter. He has several cases in supreme court. Petition Not to Issue.

It was the first meeting of the Council and all the Aldermen were present including Mr. Kelly of the Fourth Ward over whose eligibility there has been a question. The council elected Edward Burns to the office of Constable in place of H. A. Rowland who failed to qualify.

Petitions for appointment to this office were received from Carl Standke and Charles Kling. The petition presented by Mr. Standke had the endorsement of the two Justices of the Peace, nearly every lawyer in town and many business men, but in spite of this Mr. Burns was named simply on the strength of his "pull" with the Democratic Aldermen.

Mr. Standke has held the position for a couple of years. He has met with much hard luck of late. The Mayor was directed to issue his note for \$10,000 for the benefit of the Department of Education.

Oak Hill Water Supply. A communication was received from the Water Department in reference to the lack of water on Oak Hill and it was suggested that a conference be arranged to provide for the necessary relief. The Alderman acted favorably on the communication and the outlook for a speedy improvement in the water conditions is

GENTLEMEN—The Department of Water respectfully calls the attention of your Honorable body to the deficiency in the supply of water in certain sections of the city on both sides of the river, which will call for immediate attention on the part of this Department and the Common Council, to the end that conditions existing in the sections referred to may be speedily relieved or corrected by the most feasible means.

DARING ROBBERY ON THE EAST SIDE

Men Under Arrest Charged with Entering McGann and Smith's Hardware Store.

PAWNEED THE GOODS

Messrs Lepisto and Hogan Have Knives in Possession—Knives Disposed of at Cohen's—Cash Register Found in the Canal.

William Hogan and Benjamin L'uplain were arrested this afternoon for burglary and grand larceny in entering and robbing McGann & Smith's hardware store, corner of East Second and Utica Streets. Pocket knives and other articles stolen from the store were found in their possession and the police have recovered a razor and two pair of clippers which the two sold at Krato's barber shop this morning and five knives pawneed by Laplain at Cohen's pawn shop.

The robbery occurred during the night and a whole lower sash was broken in a window in the rear end of the store facing Second Street. The thieves helped themselves to knives, razors and silver tablespoons valued at \$75 and when leaving took the cash register with them. The register badly battered was found on the ice in the canal North of the upper bridge. A policeman discovered it from the bridge. The burglars thought they had a rich haul but it only contained a few pennies.

Laplain and Hogan were arrested at Cohen's shop by Policemen Hanley and Connelley. They were both slightly under the influence of liquor. Chief Doyle expects to find out, during the afternoon where the rest of the stuff is. Hogan has served time for various offenses.

Wealth and Debt Statistics. Mr. R. M.
