The first meeting of the "Old Home Week" general committee was held at the Y. M. C. A. building last evening. There was a large attendance of members, considering the inclemency of the weather and much enthusiasm was shown.

The chairman, Hon. M. L. Wright called the meeting to order at eight o'clock, and the first business done was to organize. H. R. Carrier was elected Secretary. James P. Doyle is vice chairman of the committee.

The chairman of the sub-committees were then named as follows:

R. A. Downey, finance; L. W. Mott, program, city history and resources; J. P. Doyle, invitation; J. T. Mott, speakers; A. H. Mowry, transportation; George W. Bush, decorations and illuminations; Hon. M. L. Wright, Reception; A. H. Ames, entertainment; D. S. Badcliffe, Old Home Week ball; C. J. Vowinkel, information, hotels and accommodation; L. Wegand, safety; E. W. Austin, press and publicity; W. W. Spencer, music; C. J. Vowinkel, parade.

The head of each committee except the Finance Committee is expected to select four assistants, making five the full membership, and report the names at a meeting of the general committee to be held at the same place next Wednesday night.

There was little discussion of the celebration, it being deemed best to wait until the several committees have been thoroughly organized. There was some talk as to the number of days the celebration will continue, but of course nothing definite was reached.

A communication received by Mr. Vowinkel from Carey & Medler, the proprietors of the "White City" at Baldwin's Bay, was read. They offer to give the committee a percentage of the receipts from several of their attractions and propose a grand spectacular display of fireworks on the night of July 4th.

Judging from the number of inquiries that have come from Oswego in all parts of the country regarding the "Old Home Week" there will be an immense gathering of former citizens during the week. As is already known, the first week of July, has been selected for the celebration.
