Committee Chairman Made a Brief Report on Activities

Work for Niagara Ship Canal Must Be Started at Once

The luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce at the Pontiac this noon was unusually largely attended, and there were even more present at the business meeting which followed at 1 o'clock.

Coming events scheduled are the regular luncheon on Thursday next, when R. G. Potter, secretary of the New York State Underwriters' Association and one of the big insurance men of the country, will be the speaker.

Immediately following the luncheon a meeting of the Board of Directors was held, at which it was voted to accept the names of the fourteen applicants for membership and to refer resignations received back to the membership committee.

John K. O'Connor of the Development Bureau made a report on efforts to bring the Erie Engineering Company of Chicago to this city.

Dr. R. K. Pies explained the matter of the Safety First Campaign in the public schools and the papers and said a few simple traffic rules were being prepared which might later be submitted to the city authorities for action.

President Shephard called attention to the fact that the standing committees would be expected to present full and complete reports at the annual meeting in February.
