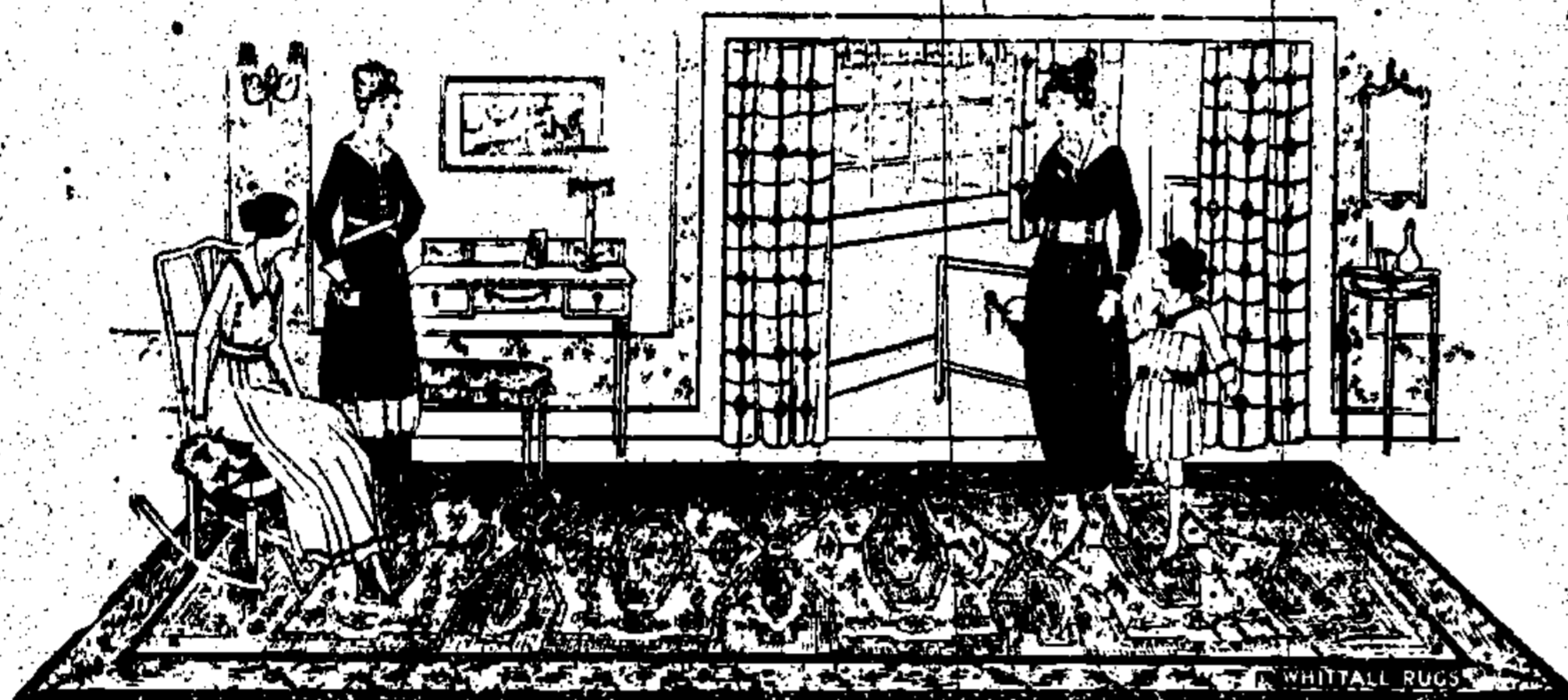

BODY IDENTIFIED BY HER SISTER AT DAIN'S UNDERTAKING PARLORS LAST EVENING

The body of the woman who died in the New York, Ontario & Western railway station yesterday afternoon, was identified early last evening as that of Mrs. Nellie Roberts, wife of William Roberts, the dyer, No. 149 West Cayuga street.

Mrs. James Claro, a sister, made the identification, after she had read of the case in the newspapers. Mrs. Roberts was on the way to the home of her sister, Mrs. Hamilton Waterman, No. 130 East Bridge street. When near the O. & W. station she felt faint and ill and turned into the waiting room. Some ladies there were attracted by her condition and notified the agent, J. H. Hartigan, who at once called Dr. J. K. Stockwell and the ambulance but she was dead when both arrived.

Last evening when Mrs. Roberts did not return home Mrs. Claro went to the undertaking parlors of Dain & Son and identified the body as that of her sister. Mrs. Roberts has been a resident of this city since her early girlhood. She attended the public schools and married William Roberts, the well-known dyer. She was a member of Grace church and besides her husband she is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Hugh Lewis, Utica; Miss Margaret Roberts of this city; a son, Percy Campbell of this city; besides five sisters, and four brothers, Mrs. James Claro, Mrs. Hamilton Waterman, Mrs. F. NO NEW CASES OF FLD REPORTED

BOARD OF HEALTH AGAIN REQUESTS PHYSICIANS AND DRUGGISTS TO GET FEDERAL LICENSES TO HANDLE LIQUOR
No new cases of suspected or actual cases of influenza or pneumonia have been reported to the Board of Health, or any other health authorities. Physicians have been requested individually to be on the lookout for suspected cases, so that the authorities may quarantine infected households, and take all precautions to prevent contagion and possible epidemic conditions. Physicians are somewhat at a loss to understand why there is but one case of influenza here and no pneumonia, while in neighboring cities cases are being reported by the dozens and scores. But, nevertheless, the health authorities will not relax all possible vigilance and are continuing preparations for contingencies that may arise. A well known druggist today pointed out that as far as any druggist here knows, there is not a single doctor in this city who is licensed by the Government to write prescriptions calling for liquor. No druggist, he states, will take out a license to sell liquor here and invest four or five hundred dollars in a suitable stock. If the physicians will be unable to write prescriptions to use the stock. He answered the Board of Health query as to whether he would take out such a license to be prepared for influenza by a counter question as to an assurance that doctors here, including those connected with the Board of Health, will interest themselves to the point of complying with the law themselves. The Board of Health today again requested that all trained and practical nurses lose no time in sending their names and addresses to the Board, either at the City Hall, or at the Health Center. This is very important, Doctor Mansfield points out.

ERZBERGER IS WORSE
Berlin, Jan. 28.—The condition of Mathias Erzberger, minister of finance was described as "worse" early today. His pulse was 120, physicians said, but temperature normal. Examination has revealed that his shoulder blade was splintered by the bullet fired by Otto von Hirschfeld, the young German student who attacked him in front of the courts building. Von Hirschfeld still is in jail. Physicians believed Erzberger will recover safely unless an infection develops.

MOTT WANTS BONUS FOR ALL SERVICE MEN

Washington, D. C., Jan. 28.—Congressman Luther W. Mott today introduced a bill in the House of Representatives providing for a bonus of \$300 for all former service men, who served during the war at least sixty days. The bill provides that the billion and a half dollars that this would require be raised by a tax of one-half of one per cent. on all sales. It is estimated that this tax would yield a billion and three quarters in one year.

300 PATIENTS SAFE WHILE FIRE RAGES
