Mrs. Captain John Davis.

About one o'clock this morning occurred the death of Mrs. John Davis, widow of the late Captain Davis. Mrs. Davis drew a pension for the services of her husband in the navy during the war of 1812. Her maiden name was Schamerhorn, and she was born in Schenectady, in the year 1800 and was therefore ninety-three years old. She was married in 1818. She accompanied her husband and came to live in the town of Scriba shortly after, and they had lived there until coming to reside with her granddaughter Mrs. Rose Hibbard, in East Mohawk street three years ago. Mrs. Davis had eleven children, of whom the following survive her: Mrs. Amelia Sweet of Englewood, Ill.; Mrs. Mary Benedict of Chicago; Napoleon Davis of Saginaw, Mich.; John W. Davis of Mackinaw, Mich., and Mrs. Rose Hibbard of this city.

Mrs. Davis was a great-grandmother and the number of her descendants is reckoned at one hundred. Till about a year ago Mrs. Davis enjoyed good health. Then she began to have trouble with her heart. About eleven o'clock last night she retired apparently in good health and spirits. About midnight she began to suffer with her heart and the family were hastily summoned, only to see her breath her last. Mrs. Davis was very much respected by all her acquaintances and friends.—Palladium of yesterday.

The Whitesboro Postoffice Robbed.

David S. Baldwin of Oswego Falls, Makes an Assignment.

David S. Baldwin of Oswego Falls, whose failure has previously been noted in the TIMES, filed an assignment in the county clerk's office this morning in favor of Albert J. Snow, of Utica street, Fulton. The total indebtedness, exclusive of liabilities for goods sold on commission, amounts to \$13,555.32. Total actual valuation of property is \$19,716 less the mortgages and liens thereon, except collateral liens which amount to \$10,648.02.
