EXPRESS COMPANIES HEATEN. Kansas City Shippers Have Law on Their Side in Matter of Revenue Tax on Receipts.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 9.—The Kansas City Transportation Bureau has appealed to United States City Attorney Warner to assist the local shippers in their fight against the express companies in the matter of the revenue tax upon receipts, and the District Attorney states that he will begin mandamus proceedings at once to compel the express companies to obey the law as the shippers interpret it.

WASHINGTON, July 9.—The War Department bulletin which gives the status of the volunteer troops for the benefit of friends and relatives differs but slightly from the previous issue of the bulletin.

The New York variations are: First New York at Fort Columbia, N. Y.; Twenty-Second New York Infantry at Fort Slocum, N. Y.; Forty-Seventh New York Infantry at Fort Adams, R. I. The Pennsylvania changes are: Governor's troop, Pennsylvania cavalry and Sheridan troop, Pennsylvania cavalry at Camp Alger, Va.; Troop A of Pennsylvania light battery at New Fort News, Va.; Troop C of Pennsylvania light battery also at Newport News.

ONLY WANTED A SLICE. Germany Simply Meant to Come in With Other Powers for a Piece of the Cake.

LONDON, July 9.—The Berlin correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says: "I am in a position to assert positively that Germany has never entertained the idea of preventing an American occupation of the Philippines. On the other hand she has desired to be in a position to share the cake if other powers are offered a slice. The rumor that Spain has already ceded a Philippine port to Germany is entirely unfounded."

INFANTA ISABELLA ACTIVE. It is supposed she is preparing to assume the Regency of Spain.

LONDON, July 9.—The Daily News prints a letter from Madrid declaring that the Infanta Isabella is actively organizing the army. She has visited the barracks and has addressed the officials and men impartially. It is supposed Queen Regent Christina's assent thereto being given for the reason that the Infanta, being a Spaniard she could better sign a treaty of peace than the present Queen Regent, whose unpopularity because she is a foreigner continues. The Infanta Isabella is very energetic and she seems to be in touch with the Spaniards, who value her experience with the government.

FATAL FIRE IN CLEVELAND. CLEVELAND, O., July 9.—Fire broke out shortly after noon today in the five-story brick building occupied by the Britton Printing Company on Erie Street, near Vincent. The flames spread quickly, and a number of employees jumped from the windows of the third, fourth and fifth floors. It is reported that several have been killed or fatally wounded.

Manager Burns offered to let the team conduct the scheduled games until the deficiency was made up and this offer, after being accepted, was rejected. Manager Burns was not able to play in Peterson for that reason.

The pick of the disbanded Brooklyn and Fall River teams of the New England League has been offered Burns, and with these players the three scheduled games at Hartford this week and the remaining games in this city will be played.

The Stars have but three men on their pitching staff now, Blackburn was given his release last evening and Manager Buckeberger will rely on Voorhees, Maloney and Becker to do the twirling work for the Stars.

The Oswegos are playing at home today. Cortland will be here for two games Monday and Tuesday.

Tim Hurst is credited with having taken some \$500 from the Browns in fines since the season opened.

The Utica Herald says that the Palmyra team made nine home runs after the game yesterday. The team generally stops at the Metropolitan Hotel, and is customary for the bus belonging to the hotel to convey the players to and from the grounds yesterday. "Dan" Ryan's boys went to the park in the bus without incident. Just opposite the City Hall, on the way home, about 6:30 o'clock, the horse attached to the bus became frightened, and started to run away. The horse ran down Geneva Street and turned into Seneca Street. The players were spilled out along the street, and the driver was thrown off his seat opposite the Butts field house. He was not seriously injured, but sprained his back. He was carried into Plumb's drug store, but was able to walk to the hotel. The bus struck a pole at the corner of Lafayette and Seneca Streets, and was badly damaged. Captain Ryan of the Palmyra team was the only player in the bus when it came to a sudden halt. FROM BAD TO WORSE

Perils Thickening Every Day Around the Spanish Dynasty.

New York, July 9.—A dispatch to the World from Madrid says: Matters are going from bad to worse for the dynasty. Despite the state of siege proclaimed throughout the whole kingdom, the authorities dare not stop the press campaign against the Queen Regent and her ministers. They do not feel certain of the support of the army in case of a popular uprising, such as would be likely to follow excessive repression.

General Weyler and Senor Rimeron Rubledo are taking the lead in the agitation, hoping that the Queen and the court will be frightened into confiding the reigns of government to them without caring to inquire whether behind their very small following of political and military adventures the Carlists and Republicans may not rush in for a part of the spoils. Many Spaniards believe that Weyler is determined to join the Carlists. Some of his friends in the army have been coquetting with the leading Carlists and the Marquis of Cerralbo, Mella, and Cervera are frequent visitors to Weyler's house. Government Simply Drifting.

The increasing boldness of all the revolutionary parties is simply due to the fact that the government is drifting along without statesmen or generals capable of carrying out resolutely a peace policy on sensible grounds. The nation would bow were it plainly shown that its fleets have been destroyed and made powerless, that its armies are on the eve of being obliged to surrender for lack of provisions, ammunition and communication with the mother country, that the state treasury is empty and Spain's credit is so impaired that money can be borrowed only by make shifts grievously compromising the future, and lastly, that there is no hope of practical assistance from Europe.

YOUSOUF DEAD.

"Terrible Turk" Was a Victim of La Bourgeois Disaster. Ismail Youssouf, "the Terrible Turk," who vanquished nearly all the American wrestlers, met a foe in old ocean who laid him low. For a month Youssouf had been in ill health. After his match with Evan Lewis, Youssouf notified his manager, W. A. Brady, that he would return to Turkey and visit his relatives, but if any new wrestlers sprang up in America he would return and give them battle. The Turk thereupon engaged passage on La Bourgeois, changed passage on greenbacks into French gold, and started for Turkey. There he met Ismail Youssouf on the wrestling pad, can easily imagine that he made a terrific struggle before death came.

Youssouf was born in Schumlah, Turkey, thirty-two years ago, and was the Sultan's favorite wrestler. He was six feet two inches tall and weighed 230 pounds.

COULDN'T GET THE BONDS.

New York Bankers Fail to Secure \$4,000,000 of Hawaiian Four and a Half Per Cents.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 9.—H. H. Pearson, Jr., and Walter Stanton of New York, representing Edward C. Jones Company of New York and a syndicate of New York banks and bankers have just returned from Honolulu, having offered the Hawaiian government \$4,000,000 premium for \$4,000,000 refunding bonds which would under the Newlands resolution become a debt of the United States.

They failed to secure the bonds as the bill before the Legislature was unsatisfactory as to maturity and form of bonds, and there was not sufficient time to make changes prior to annexation becoming a fact.

NOT WANTED IN CANADA.

Carranza and du Bose to Leave the Dominion in Obedience to Official Request.

MONTREAL, July 9.—It was learned yesterday that Lieutenant Carranza and Senor du Bose, late attaches of the Spanish Legation, who have been conducting their business from this point since the declaration of war, have taken passage on the Dominion Line steamship Ontario, which will sail from this port on July 13.

From good authority it is learned that they are taking their departure from this country at the request of the government.

WANTS DEBT LIMIT INCREASED.

Comptroller Coler of New York City Anxious to Continue Work on Public Improvements.

ALBANY, July 9.—Comptroller Coler of New York City, called at the executive chamber today to see Governor Black and impudently the chief executive to include in his message to the extraordinary session of the Legislature a suggestion that legislation be enacted to increase the debt limit of the greater city so that sufficient money can be raised to continue work on public improvements which have been begun.

Governor Black did not come down from Troy today and Mr. Coler presented his proposition to Judge Lincoln, the Governor's legal adviser, who promised to lay the matter before the Governor.

KING LEOPOLD COMING.

His Majesty of Belgium Expects to Make a Lengthy Visit to the United States.

LONDON, July 9.—The Pall Mall Gazette this afternoon says that King Leopold of Belgium starts in August on a long yachting cruise, adding that he will make a considerable stay in the United States.

Can Now Get Coal. CAIRO, July 9.—Admiral Camara has notified the Egyptian government that his squadron has been ordered to return and that therefore his vessels will pass through the canal again immediately. The squadron will now be allowed to coal as it is now going home.

First New York at Chicago. CHICAGO, July 9.—The First New York Provisional Regiment, numbering 1,300 men has arrived here over the Erie road. After a stop of a few hours the men were transferred to the Northwestern Railroad on their westward journey to join General Merritt.

Didn't Endorse Populist Candidate. COLBY, Kas., July 9.—The Sixth district Democrats in convention refused to endorse the candidacy of N. B. McCormick, the Populist nominee for Congress and the present incumbent, and nominated W. G. Hoffer, editor of the Lincoln Sentinel.

LOOKING FOR DEFEAT. General Total Apologies in Advance For the Inevitable Overthrow of His Forces. MADRID, July 9.—General Correa, Minister of War, has received the following dispatch from General Total, commanding at Santiago: "The enemy returned our wounded Tuesday. Yesterday (Thursday) I exchanged the Merrimac prisoners for Lieut. Arias and seven soldiers. The ceremony over, General Shafter sent a letter describing the complete destruction of our squadron and reiterating his demand for the surrender of the city, granting until midday Saturday for compliance, when if the town was not surrendered he would bombard it by land and sea. I communicated with Capt. Gen. Blanco and warned all forlorn hope who are now almost the only inhabitants. I shall defend the place to the last extremity. It is necessary to remember that we are short of provisions and that the troops have endured three years' campaigning. They have been a month past with only rice, salt, coffee and sugar."
