A special to the Syracuse Post-Standard says: "The New York State delegation to-day sent missionaries to delegations from several Western States to present the claims of Judge Parker. M. F. In speaking for Judge Parker, Mr. Bulger said that Tammany's opposition was of little consequence, that it was the result of a quarrel between leader and that it did not have the approval of the rank and file of the Tammany organization. He praised the consistent and loyal Democracy of Judge Parker and remarked that the Judge had given out of his own pocket \$600 to the Ulster County Committee to make up a deficiency in its fund during a Bryan campaign."

Sixty Additional Laborers and Brick Layers at Fort Ontario.

About sixty additional men were put to work this morning at Fort Ontario.
