Lodge Is Bankrupt

July 28.—Carthage lodge No. 365, I. O. O. F., has been discharged from bankruptcy, according to an order filed by Federal Judge Ray in court here Wednesday. The lodge conformed with the bankruptcy law, and is released from its debts. The lodge filed a petition in bankruptcy, showing debts of \$16,980 and assets of \$607. The construction of a temple with opera house on the ground floor and lodge rooms above was the cause of the bankruptcy.

Buffalo Bill and Preparedness

It is probable that no other individual in the United States, outside of Col. William F. Cody (Buffalo Bill), could have interested the Government to the extent of loaning soldiers from the regular army for use in a military spectacle, as has been done in the case of the Buffalo Bill-101 Ranch shows.
