RIVER AND HARBOR MONIES.

Appropriations for Greatodus Bay and Oswego.

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The senate appropriations committee has increased the amount for continuing the improvement of the harbor at Greatodus Bay from \$8,000 to \$15,000.

For improving the harbor at Oswego the house voted \$37,000, of which \$10,000 shall be expended in repairing the break recently made in the breakwater; to which the senate committee has added the following amendment, "and not exceeding \$10,000, which may, in the discretion of the secretary of war, be used for removing rock to widen and deepen the inner harbor near the mouth of the Oswego river." Late Marine.

BUFFALO, July 13.—Coal shippers found vessels very scarce yesterday and took only five, as follows: Brazil for Chicago at 45 cents; Schlesinger, Pillsbury, Gardner, Goshawk, for Milwaukee at 40 cents.

DETROIT, July 12.—The survey of the schooner Smith & Post fixed the damages from the collision with the steamer Vega at \$944.

PORT COLBORNE, July 12.—A strong southwest wind has been blowing all day. The schooner J. S. Richards ran in here this afternoon for shelter and the following craft are lying here to-night: Hill, Leighton, Hall, Crosthwaite, St. Lawrence and Grinaby.

The barge William Crosthwaite, coal, from Oswego to Milwaukee, sprung a leak this afternoon just after getting through the canal. Water is gaining on the pumps 11 inches an hour. A diver is trying to locate the leak. If unable to find it, the Crosthwaite will have to go to Buffalo to be docked.

CHICAGO, July 12.—"Lake rates—nothing doing," was the laconic reply of a line agent to his company. Up to the close of "Change it was said that not a bushel of grain had been placed for shipment, boats like the Parcell, which had been waiting here a fortnight for a cargo, were offered for half loads and were unable to secure them. The prospect of an early resumption of receipts, on account of the collapse of the railroad strike, gave hope of a better business next week.

CHICAGO, July 12.—The great sympathetic strike has come to be regarded as a huge joke along the river. All vessels arriving last night were held at the mouth of the river for fear of rioting this morning, but when it was found there was no trouble they were towed up to their docks. The lumber unloaders were so eager for work that there were two men for every job. At daylight the coal-heavers swarmed on the docks of all the coal-laden boats and captains report that they have never seen the coal-heavers work half as hard as they have today.

Law and Order.

To the Editor of the Oswego Times:

OSWEGO CENTER, July 13.—On July 2d, a goodly representative of the Town of Oswego, met in the M. E. church at Oswego Center for the purpose of organizing a "Law and Order League." The meeting was called by the pastor of the church and T. G. Thompson was unanimously chosen chairman of the meeting, and Frank Rounds, secretary. After some spirited discussion a league was organized by the adoption of a constitution the object of which is "to assist the civil authorities in the enforcement of existing laws, and to insist upon their observance." The following officers were elected: President, Leroy Pease; vice-president, Sumner E. Metcalf; secretary, Frank A. Place; treasurer, Geo. W. Baker. An executive committee was afterward appointed which represents in all its proceedings the whole league. The committee is: T. G. Thompson, Leroy Pease, Enoch A. Harsign, Ira Pease, Frank L. Place, Sumner E. Metcalf, George W. Baker and Geo. F. Shepherd. A financial committee has also been appointed, consisting of Cyrus Saire, Charles M. Barstow and Timothy Edwards. The officers and the committees were called together on Thursday night of this week at the home of the president. The work was discussed and planned. It was decided to make a "house to house" canvass of the town, to offer every person the privilege of becoming a member of the league. A committee is to be appointed from each school district to make the canvass. A general mass meeting is soon to be called at Southwest Oswego and prominent speakers will be present.

This matter is the town talk nowadays. People have not been so agitated in years before, and apparently they are in earnest. The laws are liable to be enforced in Oswego Town, is the candid opinion of OSSEVER.

"The Syracuse Post."

The above is the title of a new morning daily that made its first appearance on Tuesday last. It is an eight-page paper, republican in politics and claims it will not be the organ of any faction. The Post makes a fine appearance typographically, and has a metropolitan look that is not possessed by any paper in the state outside of New York city. Its columns are freighted with news, foreign, domestic and local. Expense in the collection of news, especially in the district in which the paper will circulate, appears to be a secondary consideration, and this fact will, unquestionably, make the Post popular in northern and central New York.

A Relic of Ancient Fire Apparatus.

In the show windows of the Oswego Dry Goods and Carpet Store will be seen a handsomely painted hose cart which is prettily decorated. This cart has a history. It was the property of the Germantown, Pa., department and during the Philadelphia riot was confiscated by the government. It was in several barracks and in time was sent to Fort Ontario. Wishing to get rid of it, it was sold to a blacksmith for five dollars, who in turn sold it to the Old Volunteer Firemen for fifteen dollars. It was painted red, but when it was decided to hold the state convention, here the cart was taken to John Thompson's paint shop and painted with aluminum paint. It was then placed in the window where it now stands admired by hundreds of passers by. In the window are a number of old fire relics and pictures of Chief Blackburn and ex-Chief C. C. Mattoon.

The Canal Break.

Superintendent Salladin has a

gang of thirty-five men at work repairing the break in the canal between Minetto and Fulton. He expects to have the job completed by Sunday night.

FULTON, July 13.—The break in the canal near the basin below here that occurred a few days since was repaired and the water let on yesterday. The repaired portion has again gone out and ten feet more. It is thought that several days will be required to make the canal navigable, unless a very large force is put on.

Prospective Removal of Regulars from Fort Ontario.
