OSWEGO LOSES THREE BRAVE SONS

East Side Young Men Fell with Company C at Samar.

LIST OF THE KILLED.

Was issued by the War Department Yesterday—Sorrow in the Homes of Joseph T. Godon, Guy Dennis and Charles Powers.

FORTY-THREE ARE SLAIN

OSWEGO BOYS KILLED.

SERGEANT JOSEPH T. GODON. PRIVATE GUY DENNIS. PRIVATE CHARLES POWERS.

An official list of the casualties sustained by the ill-fated Company C at Samar, which was given out by the War Department late yesterday afternoon, shows that three Oswego boys were among the many soldiers who fell in the terrible slaughter in the Philippines. An official list of the killed sent out from Washington gives the names of Joseph T. Godon, Charles Powers and Guy C. Dennis.

The parents and relatives of the young men received the shocking news last evening and the announcement of the sudden ending of the lives of the soldier boys was received with deepest sorrow.

Joseph T. Godon lived in East Fifth between Cayuga and Seneca Streets with his parents. He was twenty years old and enlisted in Company C at Fort Ontario previous to the departure of the Company for the Philippines. He was well known on the East Side. Born in this city, he always lived here and his friends will learn with regret of his death. Besides his parents he is survived by four sisters and a brother.

Charles Powers resided in East Seneca near Fifth and worked with his father as a carpenter and for a time was also employed at the Oswego Tool Works. He was born here and received his education in the public schools. He joined Company C when it was stationed at Fort Ontario. Two brothers and one sister survive besides his parents.

Guy C. Dennis was not always a resident of this city. He resided in Sandy Creek until about eight years ago when his father became a member of the Life Saving Crew. His father is now employed at the D. & H. freight and lives in Mercer Street. Guy was about 22 years old.

The list gives the names of three Syracuse men known to be dead. They are: Quartermaster Sergeant August F. Porezong and Privates John D. Armani and Lito D. Armani. The name of Corporal Henry J. Scharrer is also given, but his death is open to doubt.

The list gives the names of men from Utica, Oswego, Schenectady, Canastota and Watkins. The Associated Press dispatch from Washington announcing the names of the dead soldiers was as follows: "The list of the casualties sustained by Company C, Ninth Infantry, in the massacre in the Philippine island of Samar, is given in the following cablegram received at the War Department late this afternoon:

Killed September 1, Baaay, Samar, Company G, Ninth Infantry—Corporal John L. Weiss and Private Charles C. McManis.

The three officers killed in the fight are not mentioned in the list, their deaths having been reported in a dispatch sent several days ago.

Company C was well known as one of the best fighting companies in the Ninth Regiment. It departed from Madison Barracks on April 19, 1898, and arrived at Tampa, Fla., April 23, just in time to be of good service in the Spanish-American War.

The company sailed from Tampa with the Fifth Army Corps and landed at Siboney on June 25, taking part in the battle of San Juan Hill on July 1, in engagements of July 2, 3, 10 and 11 at the same place, and doing valiant duty in the siege of Santiago up to July 17, when the Spanish forces surrendered.

On August 10 the company sailed for the United States, arriving at New York four days afterward. The company suffered a good many losses in the Cuban engagements and was so greatly reduced upon its return to this country that recruiting officers had to be sent out immediately to many different cities and towns in the State to enlist new men.

The company was ordered to Fort Ontario and remained here for several months. They secured quite a number of recruits, but not enough to fill all the vacancies in the company. Consequently, it became necessary to supply men from other parts of the country. The regiment was filled on March 17, 1899, and was ordered immediately to the Philippines, going there by way of San Francisco, from which place it sailed March 28, reaching Manila on April 26, 1899.

On June 27 of the following year the company joined the allied forces in the relief expedition to Pekin. It took part in the battle of Tien-tsin on the Philippines Islands again on May 27, 1901 arriving at Manila on June 5.

THIRTY-TWO KILLED.

Found To-day That There Was No Such Man as Gustave F. Schuytler in Company C.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—On verification to-day of the cablegram received by the War Department yesterday from General Chaffee, giving the names of the members of the Ninth Infantry, Company C, who were killed in the recent disaster on the island of Samar, it has been found that there was no such man in the company as Gustave F. Schuytler, who was reported among the killed. This brings the list of killed down to 32.

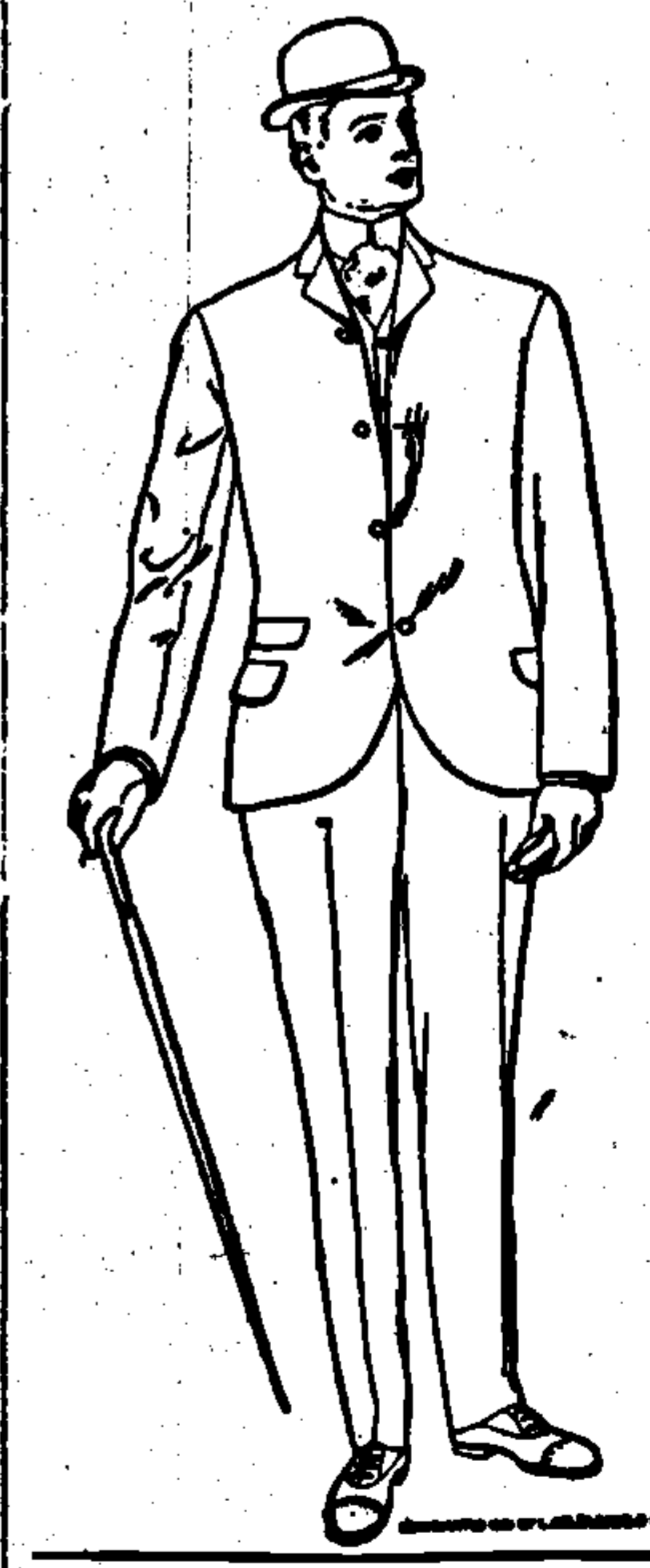
