3 OSWEGO BOYS AT PLATTSBURG CAMP

1200 Youths Are Enrolled in July Citizens' Military Camp

Three Oswego boys are included among the 1200 youths between the ages of 17 and 24 enrolled in the July Citizens' Military Training camp. The applicants come from three states, New York, New Jersey and Delaware...

The local boys who are in the Plattsburg camp are Joseph A. Schneider, who is in Second Battalion, Company E, Capt. William L. Ritter commanding. Ever Smith is also in this company. James E. Morton of this city is in the Third Battalion, Company J, Capt. G. I. Newgard commanding...

Commanding the C. M. T. C. this summer is Colonel J. Malcolm Graham, 26th Infantry, the post commander of Plattsburg Barracks. Lieut. Col. M. C. Carey, 26th Infantry, will be executive officer and Captain Hamilton Johnston, 26th Infantry, adjutant. The assistant executive officers will be: Budget, Lieut. Col. W. J. Davis; administration, Major F. C. A. Dravo...

The camp is primarily for "basic red course" students, or youngsters with no previous military training. A sprinkling of candidates from previous camps now promoted to the "advanced red," "white" or "blue" courses have been assigned to each of the twelve companies. These young candidates who in four summer camps are able to win commissions as Second Lieutenants, Officers Reserve Corps, will learn rifle shooting, principles of musketry, physical development and athletics, hygiene, infantry drill, studies in American citizenship, and on occasional afternoons ceremonial parades...

88 TREATED AT CO. SANATORIUM

Monthly Report Shows Splendid Work Done at Orwell Institution

Eighty-eight patients were treated in June in Oswego county sanatorium according to the monthly report just issued by Dr. LeRoy F. Hollis, superintendent.

The report shows the number of patients in the sanatorium, May 31, as 80. The number admitted in June was eight. Condition on admission, incipient, 4; moderately advanced, 2; advanced, 1; suspicious, 1.

Number of patients now in sanatorium, 88. Condition: improved, 55; unimproved, 22; too short time to tell, 5; incipient, 37; moderately advanced, 29; advanced, 15; non-tubercular, 2.

Patients: Male, 60; female, 28; children under 16 years, 12; United States veterans' bureau patients, 22. Total number treated, 88; number days treatment, 2407; average treated daily, 20; total day's pay patients, \$25; total day's free patients, 1523; visits by superintendent, 24; laboratory examinations made for sanatorium, 173; laboratory examinations made for outside physicians, 51; X-ray examinations, 25. Cash received in month, \$2,206.45.

The monthly report for June of Leila Labrie, director of the Oswego county occupational therapy department shows: Twenty-four patients worked; 1031 hours work under instruction; amount expended for materials, \$64.10; amount collected from materials, \$53.27; sales, \$40.50; monies returned to patients, \$67.75; cash on hand, \$321.83.

The monthly report of Lillian W. Moore, R. N., county's visiting nurse, shows that visits were made to Williamsport, Albany, Constatia, Cleveland, Amherst, Richmond, Sandy Creek, Oswego, Minetto, Grassy, Fulton and Redfield.

The following visits were made: To health officers and other physicians, 15; registrars, 3; poor officials, 3; tuberculosis cases, 26; to contact and suspicious cases, 44; child welfare visits, 20; co-operative visits to sanatorium, 5; schools visited, 7; patients sent to sanatorium, 4; specimens sent to laboratory, 18; patients sent for X-ray examination, 8.

A clinic was held at Williamsport where 39 persons were examined. The results were: Sputum, 1; suspicious, 4; pre-tubercular, 1. Two days were spent at the school fair at Sandy Creek. Total calls were 151.

Lettuce Shipments... First shipments of lettuce by muck growers of the Minetto district will probably be made early next week. At this time, the early crop will be sent to New York by express. Local lettuce always commands a good price in the markets of the metropolis. Carload shipments will also probably be started next week. The shipments, because of the unfavorable weather, are delayed about 10 days.

To Hold Band Concert... A meeting of representatives of the various organizations who are uniting with Minetto grange in the grading of the grange lawn and in the preparation for the erection of a band stand was held last night. It was decided to hold a band concert on July 28. By this time, it is thought that the bandstand will be completed.

Will Have Hike... On Saturday evening the Epworth league of the Community M. E. church will hike to the farm of M. N. Wadsworth, there to enjoy a jolly day. The hike was postponed from last week and members of the league all hope that the favorable weather continues until Saturday evening. A program of games and other amusements will be carried out on arrival at the Wadsworth farm.

BIG SHIPMENT OF BERRIES EXPECTED

Lettuce Will Go to New York as Well as Strawberries Late Today

A heavy consignment of strawberries is expected out of here over the N. Y. O. & W. railroad this afternoon for New York and probably some lettuce. The amount of each will not be known before train time. Two cars have been iced and will be all ready for the trip and if the shipment is large enough another car will be added to the string. The lettuce is done at the company's station on the Hall road, where refrigeration cars are handled as they are wanted.

The berries and lettuce going from this city today will be sold at retail in New York Saturday morning.

Dispatches from New York state that Oswego county strawberries brought from 10 to 15 cents a quart yesterday; that the fruit was small and did not arrive in the best condition. Green peas from Madison county which were shipped into New York on the same train that carried the Oswego berries and lettuce brought as high as \$3.25 per bushel and as low as \$1.50.

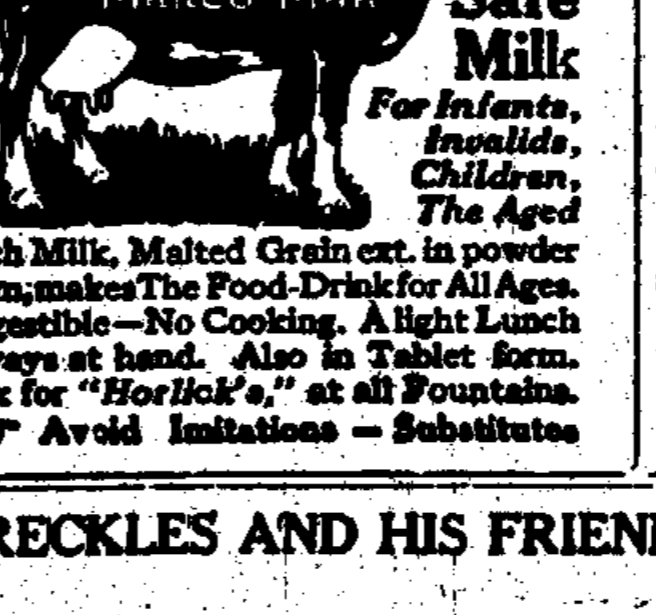
