The railway crosses the Indian reservation where lives a portion of the historic and once powerful Iroquois nation. The Indian village is in full view from the train as it crosses the cantilever bridge of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

From this bridge a glimpse of the Lachine Rapids is obtained.
