The death of Mrs. John Servant occurred this week at the Hepburn hospital. Her body was brought to her home south of this village on what is known as the Cook Road.

This is a particularly sad case as the mother leaves six children, the oldest being eleven years. Mrs. Servant is better known to our people by her maiden name, Blanche LaGray.

When Blanche was about thirteen her mother died and she became the housekeeper for her father and a mother to her younger brothers and sisters, her little sister being only a year and a half old at the time of the mother's death.

Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved family in the loss of their loved one at the early age of 31 years. The cause of the death was given as blood-poisoning. The funeral will be held Saturday morning at nine o'clock from St. Ann's church, of which she was a member.

A Shooting Accident. A shooting affair occurred in the vicinity of this village, near what is known as Raymo's Mill, early Thursday evening, when William DeCarr was shot through the left shoulder.

According to reports the shooting was done by one Robert Hess, a lumberjack. The cause of the altercation is not known but whiskey no doubt was at the bottom of it.

Hess' troopers were called and after a preliminary investigation, took Hess to Malone for confinement in Franklin county jail. DeCarr is being cared for here and it is not believed his wound is serious.

At the beginning of the hunting season, Mr. DeCarr, while out with a party of hunters was shot in one of his arms and has only just recovered from that wound.
