Todd graduates from FBI Academy

Under Sheriff Reed A. Todd of the Oswego County Sheriff's Department was among the 248 law enforcement officers graduated recently from the FBI National Academy Program at Quantico, Va. This 17th Session of the National Academy consisted of men and women from 49 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, six military organizations, two Federal civilian organizations, and twenty-two countries throughout the free world, including a representative from Hungary, which signifies the first attendance in the program by a law enforcement officer from an Eastern European country.

Internationally famous for its academic excellence, the National Academy Program, held at the FBI Academy, offers 11 weeks of advanced investigative, management and fitness training for selected officers having a proven record as a professional within his or her agency. On the average, these officers have 16 years of law enforcement experience, and usually return to their agencies to serve in executive-level positions.

Training for the program is provided by FBI Academy instructional staff, Special Agents and other staff members holding advanced degrees, many of whom are recognized internationally in their field of expertise. Since 1972, National Academy students have been able to earn undergraduate and graduate credits from the University of Virginia due to the accreditation by the university of the many courses offered.

FBI Director William S. Sessions was the principal speaker at the ceremony. The graduating officers were represented by the class spokesperson, Captain Thomas J. Dailey of the Kansas City Police Department, Kansas City, Mo.

Winter wildlife program at Amboy

Nature has equipped wildlife with unique adaptations for the harsh New York winters. Learn how animals such as the snowshoe hare and white tail deer cope when the Amboy 4-H Environmental Center hosts "Wildlife of Winter" Saturday, Jan. 9, 1-3 p.m. The activity will take place both inside and out.

Water sampler installed at Lake Neah

Members of the Lake Neah-Tawana Reclamation Committee announced in their year-end report that an automatic water sampler will be installed next spring at the westside lake.

The sampler will be installed in the lake's drainage basin to help pinpoint the location of potential problems entering the lake through adjacent creeks. The Oswego County Soil and Water Conservation District, located through adjacent creeks, has been planning with numerous problems in recent years. A 1991 study conducted by F.X. Browne outlined recommendations (Birds Eye) with help from Cooperative Extension began an education program that explains what needs to be done to improve the lake's drainage basin.

Local farmers have also been helpful to the Lake Committee. During the past year a group of farmers attended a meeting on the drainage basin.

Along with looking for funding next year, the Committee also hopes to begin work on a long-range lake master plan and make shoreline improvements. Members of the Committee include: Dr. Michael Botty, Sam Galizia, Harold Single, Joe Alletton, James Best and Fanny Knapp.

Abuse and Assault Hotline 342-1600

SAP accepts calls on a 24 hour, 7 day basis, including any within county collect calls. Hotline personnel are trained to do supportive counseling and crisis intervention on any issues involving family violence and sexual assault and to do referrals to any of SAF's programs and appropriate outside resources. Arrangements can also be made for the pick-up, transporting and sheltering of any domestic violence client needing such services.

Crime Victim Assistance Program 342-1564

This program services anyone who has been physically injured as the result of a crime as well as their family members. Crime Victims Compensation claim form assistance is also available for eligible clients. The ultimate goal of this program is to help victims restore their lives after a violent crime, by providing application assistance, court advocacy, crisis counseling, transportation and emotional support to victims and their families. Clients receive follow-up services including referrals to counseling, Elderly victims, disabled victims and victims of child sexual abuse are special populations who don't necessarily have to be physically injured to receive services.

Domestic Violence Program - Non-Residential Services

Crisis intervention is available through the Hotline at all times. Victims receive immediate attention through the telephone, and make shoreline improvements. Emergency transportation can be arranged and get the family to a safe place. Advocacy is done on a client's behalf before law enforcement personnel, court personnel, and public assistance caseworkers.

Counseling is offered through the Abused Women's Support Group which meets weekly to assist clients (residential and non-residential) in regaining decision making power over their lives. Members review alternatives to remaining in a violent environment and discuss their fears and anxieties about their relationships.

Residential Services - After an assessment, SAF provides emergency shelter, children's programming, and maintenance for victims of domestic violence and their children. Supportive counseling is available at all times to residents of the SAF House. Clients may stay at the SAF House for up to two weeks or at a safe home for up to three days. In addition, clients are referred and transported to medical facilities when necessary and to other needed services such as rental assistance, job training, therapeutic counseling and/or child care.

Relinquishing Services - For clients who leave residential services but want follow-up case management, advocacy and/or support services.

Rape Crisis Program

Crisis Intervention - Provides immediate advocacy to rape and sexual assault victims by meeting them at hospital emergency rooms and police interviews. Children under the age of 12 and special needs adults are eligible for expanded services at SAF.

Support Services - Follow-up advocacy, referral, and case management services are also available. Advocates may not initially transport victims to services but will accompany victims to court appearances and other related matters. Staff will work with victims and the victim's support network.

Counseling - Individual counseling is available for victims to assist them in coping with the effects of assault and to appropriately place responsibility for the event.

Adult Survivors of Childhood Incest Group meets weekly focusing on the participants self image, feelings toward the abuser, and the effect of the abuse on their current life situations.

Non-offending Parents Support Group has weekly meetings to provide parents of sexually abused children with a place to share feelings about the child's victimization and about the perpetrator. Signs of abuse and ways to insure their children's future safety are stressed.

Victimization Prevention Program

Presentations are made to elementary, middle and senior school-aged children by trained staff and educators and how to avoid sexual abuse through understanding good, bad and confusing touch. Presentations about date violence are also offered. Assertiveness skills to empower them to say no to unwanted touch, and to seek help should it occur, are taught.
