Fulton's businesses send message to Albany

New York's business community has used the Governor and the State Legislature to send the state a clear message: the state's current fiscal policies are not working. They are sending the message through a report titled "The Business Community's Report on the State's Fiscal Future." The report, which was prepared by the Business Community's Task Force on the State's Fiscal Future, is a 100-page document that outlines the state's fiscal problems and offers solutions. The report is a call to action for the Governor and the Legislature to take steps to address the state's fiscal crisis. The report is a clear message to Albany that the state's current fiscal policies are not working and that the business community is ready to help find a solution.
