

Fulton to host rescue volunteers

Rescue team volunteers from throughout the state will converge upon the City of Fulton Saturday, April 1, as the New York State Federation of Search and Rescue Teams holds a workshop at the Emergency Operations Center in the County Branch Office Building.

According to organizers Ralph Larkin and Steve Ives, search procedures, tactics, and strategy will be covered in the all-day confab set to begin with registration from 8 to 9 a.m. in the EOC of the county building.

"We have several informational sessions scheduled for the entire day," Larkin and Ives explained, noting there will be workshops for the New York State Police and New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, as well as experts from within the SAR organization itself.

The public is welcome and encouraged to attend this seminar, the main point of which is to have a search team. Between 9 and 10 a.m. Larkin will give an introduction to search and rescue, utilizing color slides depicting actual searches as well as exercises.

The next segment of the program will be a two-part search and rescue from the perspective of the Coast Guard from 3 to 4 p.m.

The confab will conclude with a wrap-up session and reports from 4 to 5 p.m. Hosting the all day workshop will be the Oswego County Pioneer Land Search and Rescue Team, immediate past executive coordinator of the Pioneers, now heads up the state federation. He resides in the Town of Volney. He and Larkin are charter members of the Pioneers, the first all-volunteer land search and rescue team in the state, chartered in 1971.

Election commission releases campaign audit report

The Federal Election Commission has given Rep. Robert C. McEwen's 1976 election campaign reports a clean bill of health, while discovering several "deficiencies" in the books of the Norma Bartle for Congress Committee, the campaign organization of his Democratic opponent.

The Commission made available the results of audits of the citizens for McEwen Committee and the Bartle organization, after selecting the two campaign committees for "random audits."

The Commission administers the Federal election laws and has the primary jurisdiction with respect to the civil enforcement of those regulations.

It gave Rep. McEwen's campaign committee its stamp of approval with the conclusion "no material problems in complying with the Federal Election Campaign Act were discovered." The audit covered the period from 1975 to mid-1977. It recommended that "no action be taken" against the Bartle committee because it filed "an amended report on January 6, 1978) correcting the deficiencies." The audit covered the period April, 1976 through February, 1977.

The auditors noted that her committee had "failed to itemize 16 expenditures" totaling \$1,500. Fourteen of those expenditures "represented disbursements for payroll to one individual," the audit said. The auditors noted that 12 of the 54 transfers received from political committees "were improperly reported as unitemized contributions."

Chief at conference

Joseph Varrecchia, Chief of the Fulton Police Department, will preside at a two-day conference on "Personnel Management" at Thornfield Conference Center, Ganondago Lake.

The conference is a part of the Criminal Justice Management Institute given by the State Education Center for the Public Service, University College Syracuse University.

Intended for top and middle level police officials of smaller communities, the institute deals with training the police official as a manager. The February 22-23 session was attended by 19 chiefs of police and top management personnel from 12 different departments in Central New York.
