Listen Veterans

LEGENTS WAR SERVICE SCHOLARSHIPS-- Eligible Vietnam Veterans are again reminded that six-hundred Legions War Service Scholarships worth \$350 per year, for four years, will be awarded on the basis of a state-wide examination scheduled for July 9th, 1974. The deadline for apply is June 21st. Applications are available at all New York State Division of Veterans' Affairs Counseling Centers.

COMPENSATION PAYMENTS INCREASED: Veterans receiving monthly compensation checks for service-incurred injuries will receive an increase in their checks, of about fifteen percent. The recently approved increase will be reflected in the checks eligible veterans receive as of July first. A veteran rated as ten percent disabled and currently receiving \$28 monthly will be increased to \$32 monthly while the payment for a sixty percent rating increases from \$179 to \$211 monthly. Compensation is payable to veterans who suffered wounds, injuries or diseases while serving with the armed forces, the amount being determined by the severity of the disability. Veterans rated at fifty percent or more disabled also receive dependency allowances in direct proportion to their disability. These allowances have also been increased. Veterans receiving compensation are urged to contact the local counseling center of the New York State Division Affairs located at County Building, Oswego, N. Y. for counseling and information on all provisions of the new law.

Zagame calls for legislative reform

John R. Zagame, Republican candidate for the 117th New York State Assembly District seat, this week called for a thorough re-examination of the method in which legislation is passed upon by the New York State Legislature. Zagame stated his belief that the New York Legislature should operate on a full year schedule and not the present schedule which lasts only a few months each year. "The citizens of this state," he asserted "can rightly expect that their representatives in Albany should work year round on the legislative program which affect the lives and pocketbooks of all New York State residents."

Zagame noted that the present short-term legislative session in Albany "results in an eleventh hour flood of legislation which cannot possibly be given proper scrutiny by those elected representatives of the people of New York who

must vote upon that legislation."

Zagame said that one possible solution to this problem would be a dual legislative session, with the legislature meeting in the first half of the year for the purposes of introducing legislation, and then meeting

again during the second part of the year for final consideration of these previously introduced bills. "Such a method," said Zagame, "would avoid the sort of frantic and sloppy last minute legislating which has so often occurred in recent years."

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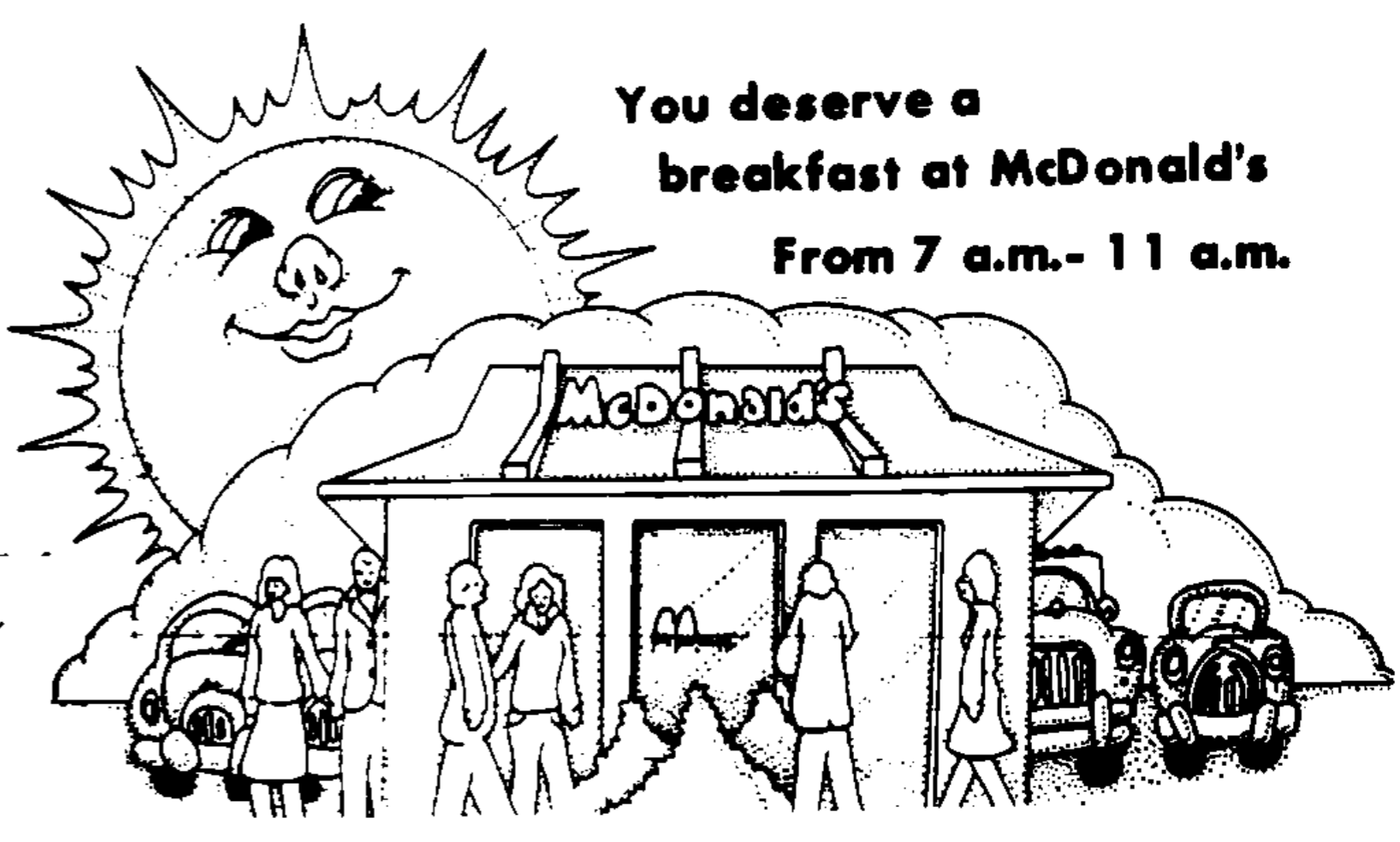
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
