Congregational

Sunday Worship Services at the First Congregational Church of Fulton will be held at 10 a.m., one hour earlier than usual, during the summer months of July and August. The time change, which will begin on Sunday, July 6, was approved by a vote of the congregation at a meeting last Sunday.

At the same meeting, the congregation authorized the trustees to proceed with repairs to the building. Outside masonry repair and painting will begin immediately, and soon work will be done in the basement to help waterproof that area.

Following that, a new floor will be put in and the restrooms will be renovated. The congregation also discussed what to do with the ceiling in the sanctuary. The ceiling will either be restored to its original condition, or a new, lowered ceiling will be installed. No final decision was made, however, because the congregation wanted to wait until everyone who wanted to be involved in the decision. Another congregational meeting has been called for Sunday, July 15, immediately following the worship service, and a final decision will probably be made then.

This coming Sunday, July 6, the 10 a.m. Worship Service will include the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

38,000 gallon wort tank installed at Miller

The production of beer from the Miller Brewing Company's new \$70 million Easton brewery under construction in the Town of Voiey near Fulton, moved a giant step closer today, with the installation of a huge wort tank at the brewhouse. The big tank will hold 1,214 barrels of wort, which is beer in its infancy. Each barrel is equivalent to 31 gallons, so the tank will hold almost 38,000 gallons of the amber liquid.

To those who are not familiar with the term, wort consists of pure brewing water combined with malt, grains and hops, prior to fermentation. The three main stages of the brewing process are mashing, boiling and fermentation. The mashing process, which produces the wort, is basically a way of converting the starches in the grains into soluble, fermentable sugars - maltose and dextrins. This is done by adding heated water to the ground grains. The temperature and chemical composition of the water - both strictly controlled - are what activate enzymes that convert the starches. The proteins, too, are partially modified during the mashing process.

When the mashing is finished, the result is wort which is then ready for the boiling process. A brewery spokesman said Miller's new plant is right on schedule, with production of beer scheduled for early 1979.

Approximately 750 people will be employed in the brewery and, according to the company spokesman, applications for production workers will be accepted after August 15. The location and hours of an employment office have yet to be arranged.

One of the features of the new Miller plant will be a hospital center which will be called the Miller Inn. When tours of the brewery move in to full swing, sometime in 1979, the center will be used as a focal point and refreshment stop. It will also be available for free use by community groups for meetings and related activities.

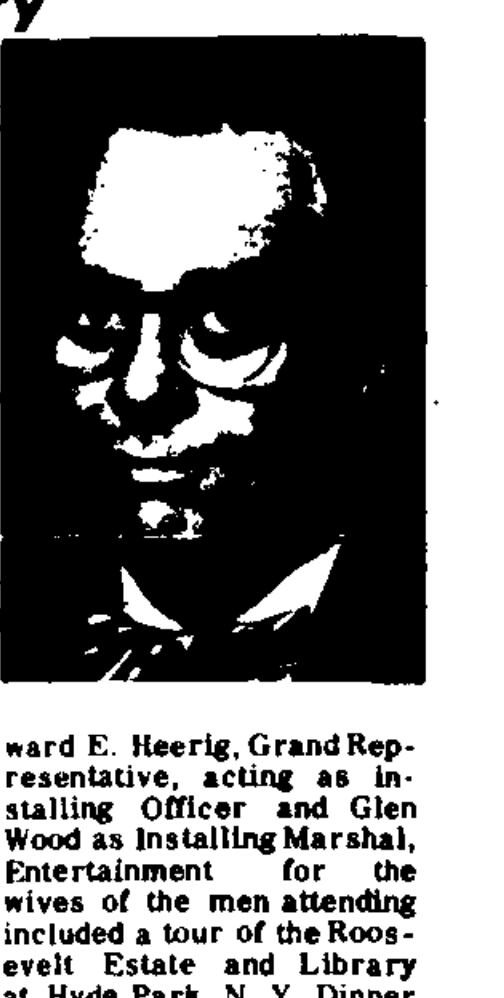
