Brewster Wedding Anniversary. The Dayton Beach, Fla. Times of Feb. 10th, carried the following account of the celebration of the 61st wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Brewster, formerly residents of Hannibal:

"In a very quiet way at their cozy apartment, 238 1/2 North Halfway avenue, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Brewster, of Dayton Beach, Fla., celebrated their 61st wedding anniversary, and also their golden wedding anniversary, the latter they celebrated in Florida. They have decided to make this their last home in the future. They have disposed of many bookshelves that might take them back north. They have two daughters, who are both living on the Pacific coast, one in Los Angeles and the other in Seattle, Wash., but they are quite content to make Florida their home.

"They are both young in spirit, despite their years, which number more than four score, and are able to enjoy every day of their pleasure-filled life. Mr. Brewster has been a busy man up until last March, when he gave up his business life and has since spent his days in a very energetic fishing life. He thanks Daytona Beach as a fine place for fishing and takes advantage of its facilities. His long business career has been in the mercantile business and he has been successful in his ventures. They have made their home in Detroit for the past 25 years and have been coming to Daytona Beach for about 17 years, and are known to many in the city. Brewster traces his ancestry back to the colony which came over in the Mayflower.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Spoon, who have been in the city for some time, are to be out again.

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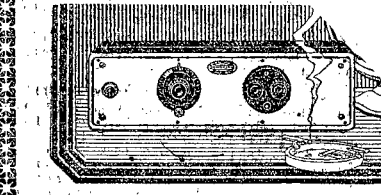
