MONTHLY HOSPITAL REPORT.
The following report for the month of January has been submitted by Miss Hazel M. Gosnell, superintendent of Lee Memorial hospital: On Jan. 1st, there were 19 patients remaining in the hospital, and during the month there was a total of 68 cases cared for. During the month there were 49 patients admitted to the institution. Those discharged numbered 38; 8 were reported as cured and 27 as improved. Unimproved cases numbered three and there were three deaths. Twelve births were reported. Obstetrical case (mother and babe) numbered 30. There were 10 medical, 27 surgical and 27 emergency cases cared for. X-rays totaled 14, still births, 12, and abortions, 2. There were 29 operations performed. On Jan. 31st, there were 28 patients remaining in the hospital.

BIBLE STILL LEADS.
Following the recent statement by commercial publishers of bibles that the sale of scriptures throughout the United States was smaller in 1930 than in previous years, the American Bible Society has just announced that the total of 5,556,779 copies of Scripture issued during 1930 from the society's headquarters at Bible House, Astor Place, New York city, is an increase of more than 1,500,000 over the figures for 1929. With the exception of 1927, this total of volumes issued exceeds that of any year in the society's history.

AUTO SHOW FOR FULTON.
Committees will be named this week to handle the various angles of the first annual automobile show which is to be sponsored by Homer Russell Smith post, American Legion, with M. J. Crandall as general manager. It is proposed to hold the exposition in the auditorium at Recreation Park during the week of April 13th, permission having been given the Legion for such use of the auditorium.
