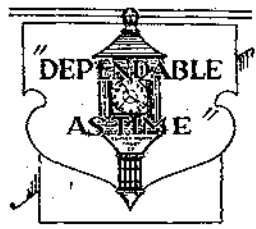
Mrs. Clifford D. Foster is in the Crouse Irving hospital at Syracuse convalescing from an operation on Feb. 23d.

INCOME TAX RETURNS.
The dead line for filing income tax returns was extended from March 15 to March 31, it has been announced by the internal revenue bureau, acting on a treasury department decision. Those who take advantage of the rule to defer filing their return must pay interest at 6 per cent per annum on the first quarterly installment from March 15.

The instructions that went forth were addressed to "collectors of internal revenue and others concerned," and said: "In accordance with the provisions of Section 53 of the revenue act of 1932, an extension of time for filing income tax returns for individuals, fiduciaries and corporations for the calendar year 1932 is hereby granted up to and including March 31, 1933, and the return, when so filed, shall be accompanied by at least 1-4 of the tax, together with interest of such amount that the rate be at 6 per cent per annum from March 15, 1933."
