OIL BURNER EXPLODES; DOES MUCH DAMAGE

An explosion of a boiler in the Lewis House last Wednesday afternoon endangered several persons, caused damage in excess of \$200, broke a large plate glass window, raised several floors several inches and caused a report that was heard over several blocks.

Located directly under the front office of the Citizens National bank, the blast raised the floor several inches and startled employees of the bank who were completing their day's work. Mrs. Isabelle Ferguson, stenographer at the bank, stood directly over the boiler as it blew up.

David Griffiths, manager of the Strand Union store next to Foster Brothers, said the floor of the store was raised two inches by the explosion. A pane of glass three feet in width by nine feet high was blown out of the show window in the front of the store. The shock of the blast was felt throughout the hotel and in Campbell's market, the last store in the east side of Cayuga street that is heated by the boiler.

HOSPITAL REPORT.

The January report of the Lee Memorial hospital shows the following: Patients in hospital Jan. 1, 26, admitted during the month, 43; discharged, 53; deaths, 3; remaining in hospital, Jan. 31, 8; births, 11. Medical cases totaled 16; surgical, 10; obstetrical, 34, and emergency, 5. There were 13 operations performed and 10 X-ray examinations made. Residents treated totaled 55 and non-residents, 14.

WEST SIDE STATION CLOSED.

The west side police station in West Broadway, which has been the headquarters for patrolmen in the west side business district since shortly after the police department was organized about 30 years ago, will be discontinued on Feb. 28, according to a resolution adopted by the fire and police commission at a meeting Monday evening. This will save the department \$300 a year.

The bill of Seymour Cole for \$130.50 for policing the public parking place north of the plaza last year was approved and referred to the common council.

The report of Fire Chief Harry L. Wauha and Police Chief E. J. Dyer for January were accepted. Chief Wauha reported 15 fires during the month, none of which were serious, and Chief Dyer reported 29 arrests, of which 26 were for intoxication. Fines totaled \$10 and 468 cars were seized. Seventy-one complaints were entered.

FIRE AT MIRABITO GROCERY.

An overheated furnace pipe at the grocery store and home of Ross Mirabito, 601 Erie street, caused a bad blaze Tuesday morning. The fire ignited a kerosene barrel nearby and the flames spread rapidly up through the partitions to the second floor, where the family resided.

An alarm was sent in and Mirabito rushed to the second floor and his wife carried their three children through the dense smoke to safety.

The fire department was hampered in its work by the dense smoke and battled more than an hour before getting the blaze under control.

The building was badly damaged and the grocery stock ruined. The loss is placed at about \$8,000.

SUES FOR DAMAGES.

Miss Isabelle VanHuser, 425 Cayuga street, known as one of the "Van Huser Sisters," is suing \$10,375 damaged in a negligence suit filed in the county supreme court against John Foltan of 147 West First street, a local coal dealer.

Injuries suffered by Miss VanHuser in an accident while she was driving to the Holy Family church on the morning of May 10, 1931, have prevented her from continuing her vocation as a dancer and singer.

The accident occurred at Cayuga and Third streets. Miss VanHuser alleges Mr. Foltan was negligent and did not have his car under control on reaching the intersection.

Mr. Foltan has filed an answer, denying that he was negligent and disclaims responsibility for the accident.

TREES TO PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Four hundred and twenty-five schools in New York state have taken advantage of the offer made by the New York College of Forestry, Syracuse, to supply a collection of seedling forest trees.

Each collection consists of 15 species. The trees will be used in the classrooms and laboratories of schools. Collapsible cardboard containers are sent with the trees in which they are planted. The variety of species in the collection will lend itself to the establishment of an arboretum on the school grounds or planting in school forests, if the trees survive the class room use.

Last year a distribution similar to this was carried out and it attracted the interest of students and teachers generally. The interest this year is even greater than before and certainly timely, in view of the general nation-wide forestry developments and programs. With this in mind, it is more important than ever that the youth of the state learn something of the trees which are such an important natural resource.

HOMESPUN YARN.

The school lunch hot dish is a good starter for the afternoon's work. For durability, choose plain weave dress fabrics rather than novelty weaves or yarns. Woolen garments should be dried flat in winter, as freezing causes them to shrink. To teach a child fear of thimble you wish him to avoid does not make him more cautious, but hampers his emotional development. Elastic goods wear longer when washed with mild soap and a soft brush, rinsed thoroughly in lukewarm water and hung to dry slowly at room temperature. If cocoa is substituted for chocolate in a cake recipe, butter should be added to replace the fat in the chocolate. Three tablespoons of cocoa and one-half tablespoon of butter are equal to an ounce of chocolate.
