Market Moss

Irish Moss, clogging the waters from Maine to North Carolina, is being raked from the sea and marketed. One of the chief uses of this moss before prohibition was in the "fining" or removing of malt cloud from beers and ales. High import costs forced East Coast moss into commercial recognition several years ago. As far back as 1835 Irish Moss was imported from Ireland as a cure for tuberculosis at a cost of between one and two dollars a pound.

Dry Beans

Gardeners who have snap beans maturing on the vines may wish to let the pods ripen and dry, to furnish some dry beans for winter use. After frost the plants are pulled and dried; the beans are threshed out, and stored in dry place. For control of weevils they should be treated with carbon disulfide or other fumigant, available from most drug-stores or seed stores.

Cook With Care
