DEMOCRATIC BLUNDER

The Birmingham, Ala. Post, a leading daily newspaper in the Democratic south, calls attention editorially to one surprise that came out of the Democratic National committee meeting and Jackson Day dinner in Washington.

We don't mean the extraordinary spectacle of a national committee, supposedly neutral as regards Democratic candidates, usurping the functions of the party convention six months in advance by virtually picking the nominee. That was unusual, but not surprising, because the president long since killed off other potential candidates and so personally had to pick the man to name him for a fourth term or go without a serious contender.

Of the Republicans had dubbed the president the foreign candidate many of his supporters would have resented this as a slur. But for the president's henchmen—or whatever it was that decided to stress alleged allied support in the committee resolution—to make such a point is something new in American politics.

It is a fact that a second thought denial is almost inevitable in fairness to the president, we hope he does dispose of these unfortunate and unwarranted implications.

AIRPORT ACTIVITY TO BE DORMANT DURING THE WAR

With the air cadet training program at Oswego State Teachers' college and the Fulton airport scheduled for cancellation in the near future under the army curtailment program, the construction of a hangar at the field, recently contracted for with John E. Howard, will be cancelled.

The common council had authorized the mayor to enter into an agreement with O. P. Hebert of the Soffar Flying school, who took over the CAA contract to instruct State Teachers' college cadets in flying, wherein Hebert was to construct a hangar, repair shop and class room facilities at the field at a cost not to exceed \$9,000.

Hebert is to continue the training of the army cadets at the airport under temporary CAA approval of the field until the last contingent has completed its 40-hour training probably in three or four months. A war department announcement several days ago advised Oswego State Teachers' college officials that no more cadets would be assigned to the detachment group there after the present group had completed its current course.

As soon as Hebert completes his contract with the CAA the Volney airport will probably be closed entirely until after the war, at which time it may be reopened as a municipal airport by the city.

JUDGE WILSON RESIGNS
