Eggs in Water Glass

Mrs. R. M. writes: "How much water glass is needed to preserve eggs? Is it all right to use washed eggs to preserve for the high-price period of the year?"

From the poultry department of the New York State College of Agriculture comes the reply: "For the best flavor, select clean eggs that are not more than a day old. Eggs that have been washed or wiped with a damp cloth do not keep well in water glass.

"Sterilize an earthen jar or wooden tub with boiling water. Mix one quart of liquid water glass from the drug store with nine quarts of water that has been cooled after it has been boiled. Pour this into the container, and place the eggs carefully in it. A six-gallon crock will hold about 14 dozen eggs. If the water glass does not cover the eggs, add up to three quarts of water for each ten quarts of the original mixture. Keep the eggs in a cellar or other cool place, with a lid over the container to prevent evaporation of the water."

Does Farm Need Bees?

Mr. V. H. of Massena, writes: "Would a few hives of bees benefit our orchard and garden. Some of our vines, like cucumbers, do not set much fruit."

Prof. E. J. Dyce says: "During the past year a large number of colonies of bees have moved into your area. They gather honey from the clover hay of the area. If there are a few colonies within two miles of your farm, they will take care of the pollination requirements of your crops. George Rasmussen of Onondaga, president of the Empire State Honey Producers' association, can tell if a beekeeper has any colonies of bees near your farm."

RATION REMINDER

Meats, Fats — Red stamps A8 through M8 good indefinitely.

Processed Fruits, Vegetables—Blue stamps A8 through K8 are good indefinitely.

Sugar—Sugar stamps 30 and 31 are good for five pounds indefinitely. Sugar stamp 40 good for five pounds of canning sugar through Feb. 28, next year.

Gasoline—In 17 east coast states A9 coupons good through May 8. Tire Inspection—Regular inspection not required after April 2. Fuel Oil—Period 4 and 5 coupons good through Sept. 30. Shoes—Stamp 18 in Book 1 good through April 30. Airplane stamp 1 in Book 3 good indefinitely.

Grind Feed

Barley, oats, wheat, rye and kafir grain are quite palatable dairy feeds. All grain should be ground or crushed for dairy animals. A coarse to medium grind is preferred to finely ground material.
