PLAN MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN
Details of the Oswego County Farm Bureau membership campaign were discussed at a meeting of community chairman at Mexico Monday. According to William F. Kranze of Mexico, chairman of the executive committee, considerable optimism was expressed at meeting the goal of 1,800 members for 1953. The membership in the county for 1952 was 1,973.
Those attending the meeting expressed optimism that because farmers make up less than 4 per cent of the total population of New York state and only about 18 per cent of the total population of the United States, it is necessary to have a strong, vigorous farm organization to speak for farmers and do what they want done. It was with this in mind that the chairman set the higher goal for 1953.
The county was divided into North and South sides. The North side selected Peak Hammons of Scriba as captain and the South side chose Erwin Rumions of Palermo.
Dates for canvassing were set from Oct. 22 to Nov. 10 and the final round-up will be held at Mexico High school on Monday Nov. 10.

THE SERVICE OF THANKSGIVING AND DEDICATION

About 200 persons attended the service of thanksgiving and dedication upon the completion of the new revised standard version of the Holy Bible held last evening at All Saints Church. Dr. John Olson, professor of Bible and Religion at Syracuse University gave the address "The Word of Life in Living Language." He stressed the great need of using the Bible more in everyday life; to learn to know it more intimately. It is not only important to learn to know it, but twice as important to teach the children to know and love it.

The new revised standard version of the Bible is the culmination of more than 25 years of work by 32 of America's leading Bible scholars appointed by the International Council of Religious Education representing over 40 Protestant denominations. The members of this committee are Drs. George Dahl, James Muehlenberg, Julius A. Bewer, J. Philip Hyat, Fleming James, Luther A. Waigle, Millard Barrows, Harry M. Orlinsky, Herbert G. May and William A. Irwin.

This observance is to deepen the religious life of the people and prepare the way for a mighty revival of religion; to encourage a wider reading and study of the Bible in the homes and churches; to inform citizens of the United States about the revised version and to celebrate its completion as a historical moment in the great tradition of translating the Bible into the people's language.

The film "Adventure in Our Town" was shown and was a full and complete explanation of the new Bible. Due to recent archeology findings the members of the Standard Bible committee have brought to the people a more accurate, more easily understood version of the Bible. It has made the Word of God a living message.

The National Council of Churches provided gift volumes of the revised version. They requested these be presented to community leaders active in church work, to a person in public education, to one in church school work and to an active Christian family. In compliance with the request Rev. William VanArsdale, president of the Fulton Council of Churches, presented copies to the following: Miss Nina Palmer, All Saints Church; Charles Chesebrough, Congregational; Warren Nye, Presbyterian; Kenneth Wilcox, State Street Methodist; G. Ray Bodley, First Methodist; and the family of Charles Downs of the Baptist Church.

At the conclusion of the presentation a coffee hour was observed at which time the opportunity was given to view a large display of old and unusual Bibles. Many 1800 Bibles were on display and one-hundred family records dating back to 1772. There were miniature Bibles and many in foreign languages. There were Bibles written in Norwegian, French, German, Hebrew and other languages.
