

In the name of God Amen I Barnet Whipple  
of the town of Mexico, County of Oswego and State  
of New York being weak of body but of sound Memory  
(Alas be God) on this tenth day of March. A.D. 1824  
Eight hundred and twenty four, make and publish this my  
last will and testament, in manner following (that is to  
say) First I give to my beloved wife Susette, all my real and  
personal estate, during her life except my bond tools which  
I shall hereafter dispose of - To my son Barnet Whipple I  
give the bond tools on which I am, together with that  
part of my property which he now possesses that I  
desire to have before the date of this will - and to my daughter  
Calista one sh. of Kitchie & having as soon as may  
be obtained, and at the decease of my wife Susette Whipple  
I will give my four daughters (viz) Lydia Lamb, Mary  
Bebe, Hester Fry and Calista Turner, all my real  
and personal property which will be left at my wife  
Susette's decease to be equally divided between them  
I furthermore order that all further debt owing and  
due and against me at my death shall be paid out  
of the property which my wife Susette possesses during  
her life - like wise for the Execution of this my  
last will and testament I do ordain and appoint  
my wife Susette Executrix together with Seda Bebe  
Executor, in testimony whereof I have hereunto set  
my hand and seal the day and date above written  
in presence of

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Oswego County, N.Y. Be it remembered that on the  
fourteenth day of April in the year of our Lord  
One thousand Eight hundred and twenty four, before  
me Charles Hayden Esquire Judge of said County at  
Mexico in said County personally appeared Sedding  
Brewster, one of the subscribers writing to the preceding  
will and made and that he saw Barnet Whipple the  
said testator signs the said will the seal thereof having  
been previously affixed, that he believes that after the  
signing the said testator acknowledged the said instrument  
and that he is his own mind and that he in the writing  
subscribed the same as witness, in the presence of the testator,  
and as he may them inform, as his thoughts at  
his instance - that he may present when he shall write  
myself Sedding Brewster, but did not see them write and  
gather that the testator appeared to be of sound  
mind and had full use of his mind - Witness my hand this
