NEWS.

N. Y. Legislature.

SENATE, Feb. 17.—Murphy reported the bill to enable the consolidation of the American and Foreign Bible Society with the American Baptist Publication Society.

The Senate agreed to adjourn from tomorrow until the 23d inst.

The Senate agreed to hold an executive session to-day to confirm loan commissioners and notaries public.

Mr. Lord called up his resolution to pay the principal and interest of the State bonds prior to the 25th of February, 1862, in coin.

On motion of Mr. Genet, the resolution was referred to the Finance Committee.

ASSEMBLY.—The House agreed to adjourn from tomorrow till the 1st of March. At the morning session, the general canal appropriation bill was passed to a third reading.

In the evening, Mr. Nachtman moved that the State excise law be referred to the first Committee of the Whole. Carried.

The House, in Committee, disposed of the following bills:

To regulate the sale of intoxicating liquors in the State.

Mr. Mitchell moved that the Committee report progress, as a similar bill was up in the Senate. Carried.

Relative to the Court of Special Sessions in and for the county of New York. This repeals the act creating the present Court, and restores the old law.

Mr. Barnes moved to strike out the first section.

Congressional.

FEB. 16.—SENATE.—Mr. McDonald, from the Committee on Post-offices and Post roads, reported a bill authorizing the construction as post-roads, of tunnel tubes for railway purposes, from New York city to the Brooklyn and New Jersey shore, with an amended proviso that said tunnels shall not obstruct nor impair the navigation of the rivers.

Mr. Fenton introduced a bill declaratory of the tariff act of August 5th, 1861. It declares that the said act shall not be permitted to interfere with the existing treaty stipulations with Russia, and directs the Secretary of the Treasury to refund in coin, the amount of duties levied on Russian hemp since the passage of the act, in excess of the rate on Manila hemp, and appropriates \$200,000 for the purpose.

Mr. Drake introduced a bill amending the naturalization laws. He referred to the pending propositions upon the subject, and that his own opinion was that the change was demanded not in established principles of law respecting natu-

the law, so that while safeguards were provided against the recurrence of the terrible frauds heretofore perpetrated, access to naturalization by well disposed persons might not be impeded. Such was the purpose of his bill.

The Mississippi bill was then taken up.

Mr. Willey's amendment to repeal the conditions in the Virginia bill was defeated by yeas 23, nays 36.

A vote was then taken upon the amendment of the Senate Committee to strike out of the bill all the conditions, and simply declare the State entitled to representation, which was voted down. Yeas, 27; nays, 32.

The bill was read the third time, and passed by a party vote. Yeas, 50; nays, 11.

The Senate at 5:30 adjourned.

HORSE.—The bill to prevent and punish polygamy in Utah, was debated. The House at 1:30, P. M. went into the Committee of the Whole on the legislative Appropriation bill.

The Secretary of the Interior gave a decision on Tuesday last in the matter of the amount of pensions to be paid to the children of soldiers who lost their lives in the service of the Government. He rules that where there is more than one child, each child is entitled to two dollars in addition to the regular eight dollars per month after the death or marriage of the mother.

CUBA.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—There is no truth in the report that the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate have divided on the Cuban question. The deliberations thus far have been harmonious, and it is probable that they will make a united report. It is considered likely that they will report favorably on Mr. Morton's neutrality bill, with some modifications.

From the Pacific.

SAN FRANCISCO, FEB. 17.—The mail steamship "Japan" brings Yokohama dispatches to the 24th of January. Extensive fires had occurred in that place. Authentic information from Nagsake conveys the intelligence that the government of Mikado had enforced the departure from the main land of seven hundred native Christians against the unanimous protest of the foreign representatives. The rice crops of the Province of Echigo are a total failure. The telegraph line between Yeddo and Yokohama has been completed, the first message having been sent over the wires on the 7th of January.

Advices from Hong Kong, China, by mail steamer, are to the 12th of January. Three vessels had been chartered at Shanghai to carry Chinamen to New Orleans.

The British schooner "Ada" was totally wrecked on the 6th of January, on the East Saddles, and three lives were lost.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 17.—The main building of the extensive woolen mills of John H. Bruner, on Hamilton street, extending over the whole block between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, one of the largest in the Union, was destroyed by fire to-day. Loss, \$400,000.

ROCHESTER, Feb. 17.—In the Court of Oyer and Terminer, Patrick Beahan, on trial for killing Thomas Maginnis, last April, in Mumford, was found guilty of murder in the first degree. The jury requested of the Court to visit the extreme penalty of the law. The prisoner was remanded for sentence.

ALBANY, Feb. 17.—The Democrats of the Senate, in a caucus this evening, agreed to Mr. Hardenburg's bill to abolish the contract system on the canals.

MONTGOMERY, Feb. 17. Both Houses of the Legislature have been all day endeavoring to make valid the bill to uproot the present municipal government of Mobile. Harrington, the newly appointed Mayor, calls for troops, but the Governor positively refuses to send them.

ATLANTA, Feb. 17.—In the Legislature to-day, the House concurred in the following Senate resolutions:

Resolved, That all proceedings in the several courts of the State founded on any debt contracted prior to June 1st, 1865, and all levies and sales by virtue of any execution so founded, shall be stayed until twenty days after the recess shall have expired, and, in compliance with the just demands of the people, we earnestly appeal to General Terry to sanction and enforce this resolution after its approval by the Governor.

Both Houses to-day adjourned for sixty days.

By the Cable.

PARIS, Feb. 17.—The Journal Official publishes an Imperial decree, which, by request of the Minister of Justice, annuls the decree of 1851 giving the Government the power of transporting to penal settlements parties who belong to secret political societies. The Minister says this power is abolished because it is incompatible with a liberal government.

Gustave Flourens has been sentenced to six months imprisonment.

Publication of the Mercator, to two months imprisonment, and five hundred francs fine for publishing false news.

MADRID, Feb. 17.—The Carlist disturbances at Marcia, Calatagua, and other places have been promptly suppressed. There are unmistakable indications that the Carlists are plotting for a general outbreak in the spring. The government is aware of their designs and is prepared to meet them.

Latest News.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 18.—An earthquake to-day caused the hotels and public buildings to be vacated instantly. The streets were filled with people before the shock ceased.

Fortunately it occurred about recess time, and the teachers managed to keep the children under control, many of them being out playing.

One school house was the scene of quite a panic.

The custom house was uninjured, but it was soon emptied of its occupants. The cracks made in buildings by the shock of October widened a little, but no material damage was sustained.

Chicago, Feb. 18.—The third annual meeting of the Woolen Manufacturers Association commenced in this city yesterday.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The House Committee on Foreign Affairs yesterday, discussed at length the resolutions relative to the contest between the people of Cuba and the Government of Spain, introduced yesterday by Mr. Banks. No conclusion was arrived at. The consideration of the subject will be resumed at the next meeting of the Committee.
