PEOPLE AND POLITICS.

A German Scientist has been making some observations on South Africa on the subject of the influence of repeated detonations on the ear. He examined the ears of 98 soldiers before and after a battle, and found marked changes in no fewer than 44, or nearly 50 per cent. In seven cases he found small hemorrhages in the ear, and in one case a large bleeding, while the lining covered the edge of the ear drum to become red in 27 cases.

Frank Rockefeller, a brother of John D. Rockefeller, has been spending several weeks on his big ranch at Belvidere, Kan. The ranch has about 13,000 acres of pasture and Mr. Rockefeller raises a large number of short-horn and Hereford cattle. He has cattle interests also in Arizona and New Mexico, where he has recently been.

The Bath Corporation has just erected a tablet on No. 22, the Circus, which was the residence of the Andra family, and the English home of poor Miss Andra, the young British officer, who was executed by Washington as a spy. The house in the Circus has always been an object of great interest to Americans who visit Bath, and the erection of the tablet upon it will in future enable us to be more easily identified. The inscription reads: "Here dwelt Miss Andra, A. D. 1710."

Among the colleges Harvard was the best represented at the recent republican convention. Besides Governor Roosevelt, Secretary Long, who was also mentioned for the vice presidential nomination, was a Harvard man, having graduated in 1871. Senator Wolcott, the temporary chairman, was graduated from the law school in 1872, the same year in which the late President Hayes was graduated. Senator Pease, who had an important part in the preparations for the convention, took his bachelor's degree in 1881.

There is now a clericalism of the Church of England who has married his deceased wife's sister, in spite of all the protest in the House of Lords who vote consistently against any recognition of the practice. The name of this daring innovator is the Rev. George Esdaile, and he is the priest of the diocese of Malvern. His bishop, Dr. Gee, formerly rector of St. George's, Bloomsbury, has suspended him for 12 months, but this apparently is only a formal rebuke to the conventional church, feeling on the subject. He will receive a new appointment in the diocese at the expiration of his extended honeymoon.
