BURNS MUST GO TO PRISON. Court of Appeals Affirms Conviction of Auburn Boy For Rape, First Degree.

Among the decisions handed down by the Court of Appeals, to-day, was the following: "The People vs. Burns. Judgment of conviction affirmed."

This is undoubtedly the case of Mortimer Burns, convicted of rape, first degree, on Mary Heald. Burns' attorney, Robert L. Drummond, when informed of the decision, said it undoubtedly referred to his client, as he had expected a decision for a month or more.

This meant that Burns, who has been in jail since his arrest nearly three years ago, must now begin his 10 years' sentence in Auburn prison.

Nothing has been heard from Core, who escaped from the officers on the night of his conviction, and the affirmation of judgment in the Burns case will doubtless be an additional incentive to him to keep away from town.

'T WAS HEART TROUBLE. The cause of the demise of Robert B. Warwick, of Fleming, who died suddenly at his home Sunday afternoon, was heart trouble, caused by over exertion, Coroner Laird decides.

The funeral will be held at his late home in Fleming to-morrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The services will be charge of St. Paul's lodge, F. and A. M., of which the deceased was a member. Burial will be in the Fleming cemetery.

MANY WENT IN THE RIVER.

Labor Plot Causes Unrest in Excitable New York.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—In a labor riot at the foot of Wall street yesterday afternoon a pier being built there, 15 men, all of whom were rescued, were thrown into the river. Two of them were taken to Gouverneur hospital, where it was said they were in a serious condition. The others suffered no injury further than a thorough dressing.

The riot lasted more than 15 minutes and before it was quieted 30 police regiments had been called from the Old Slip station. According to the story related to the police, the contractor defied the unions and employed other laborers with the union laborers. Most of these were iron workers. At noon, when the men stopped for luncheon, agitators appeared on the scene and attempted to get them to go out.

A general fight followed and when several policemen attempted to interfere they were overpowered. The rioters began throwing each other into the river after hard charges ensued. A large number of policemen were congregated and one sent to call for the police reserves. When they arrived they found that from 12 to 15 persons were in the icy river struggling for life. Ropes were found and they were rescued.

Meanwhile fully a thousand persons had gathered on the pier, and it seemed for a time the trouble would break out afresh until the police charged the crowd.

When his escape became known the alarm was spread immediately, his family notified and searching parties hunted all night long without success, the police joining in the search. Every freight car in the New York Central yards was searched and inquiry made in several parts of the city. Last night was bitter cold and the fact that he had not been found, by daylight was strength to the suspicion that he had been frozen to death.

The father thought the lad might have wandered to his old neighborhood and he went there about 10 o'clock this morning where he found him comfortably situated in the home of Mrs. Fealey. He had told her a plausible story, concealing the fact that he had escaped from the hospital, and she took him in and made him comfortable. He detests going back to the hospital and arrangement has been made to leave him where he now is.

NO USE FOR "SISSEES." Chancellor Day, of Syracuse University, makes some remarks on the Ministry.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Chancellor James R. Day, of Syracuse University, read a paper on "Church Ghosts" yesterday at the Methodist preachers' meeting. He declared that about the worst thing in the whole world was a "sissy minister."

He said: "A harpy hunter is a hired man telling ghost stories to amuse children. He is a stumbling block and no help to the church. But we should tolerate the critics. Besides, we cannot stop them and I don't know that we ought to if we could. They cannot hurt the church unless we stop preaching Christ and preach them. They have as much right to their opinions as others have to theirs."

"Nor need we worry about miracles. They will take care of themselves. The New Testament miracles were very great ones. They are not so important now. Don't let little men dominate your churches, men who are hopeless at 50. But a kid ministry is the bane of the church. Ministers should work as hard as men in other professions, and they are also entitled to equal opportunities. Don't think you because you refuse to believe in church ghosts you have lost your faith."

ESCAPED FROM THE HOSPITAL.

And Arthur Wheeler Found Yesterday Care in Home of Former Neighbor.

Arthur Wheeler, the 19 year old son of Henry E. Wheeler, small for his age, was a patient at the City hospital for over three weeks up to about 6:45 o'clock last evening. While temporarily deranged he escaped from that institution at about that time and as a result searching parties hunted for him all night long and he was not found until about 10 o'clock this morning, in the home of a former neighbor who was caring for him tenderly. He appears to be none the worse for his trip.

Young Wheeler was taken to the hospital a little over three weeks ago, suffering from neuralgia of the heart and a fever, the latter making him delirious at times. On New Year's eve he escaped and went to a house in Chapel street where he was found a short time later and taken back to the institution. He made a second break last evening. He was given a pass by the hospital physician to go to the bathroom and his prolonged absence aroused suspicion. A search was made for him which revealed the fact that he was missing. He had escaped by the back door and was tracked through the snow to the sidewalk on Lansing street where further trace of him was lost.

It was at first supposed that he was clad only in his night robe and slippers but further investigation proved that he had taken from a closet a coat, hat and pair of trousers and he also had on a pair of low shoes. On reaching Lansing street the physician developed, he made his way to North where he bought a car going South and at the corner of Genesee street he went into Smith's drug store until the State street car arrived. This he boarded and a short time later he rang the bell and entered the house in the home of Mrs. Samuel A. Peasey, No. 8 Derby avenue, next door to the house in which he formerly lived with his family.

A KING'S POEM.

Autograph Verses by James I. in a Book Owned in Boston.

An interesting volume in the Boston Public library is Montaigne's "Essays," printed early in the seventeenth century, which was owned by James I., the English king who was so largely responsible for the publication of the accepted version of the Holy Bible. The book is the first English translation of the great French author and was made by John Florio, a friend of many of the famous Elizabethan writers, including Shakespeare himself, who drew several suggestions from his pages for well known passages in his plays.

The Boston library copy has a modern binding, but the ancient fly leaf is preserved on which is written the following poem, in King James' autograph:

Here lieth I hark to the anatomic Of my frail heart, O humane devils O treat the Almyche, lyk the Almyche's word O put on me thy robe as byblom lord Thou piteest none more me in thy blest helpe

And in my soull thy secret law engrave. The queer words and quaint spelling are characteristic of early Scotch poetry, which King James, as a Scotchman himself, took great delight in writing, and perhaps the average reader will have no more difficulty in deciphering the royal meaning than in making out a page in a modern Scotch dialect novel.

Liquid Oxygen. Liquid oxygen when first formed is milky in appearance owing to the presence of some impurity which may be removed by passing it through ordinary filter paper. When pure, it is of a pale blue color, which, however, is not due, as some have thought, to the presence of liquid ozone, which is of a dark blue color. Liquid oxygen is a nonconductor of electricity, but is strongly magnetic. It may be lifted from a cup by presenting the poles of a strong electro magnet. It seems to have very slight chemical activity, since it will extinguish a lighted match and has no action on a piece of phosphorus dropped into it. It is well known that the A and B lines of the solar spectrum are due to oxygen, and from experiments on the top of Mont Blanc it is thought they are largely if not wholly due to the oxygen in the earth's atmosphere. Professor Dewar showed that these lines come out very strong when liquid oxygen is interposed in the path of the rays from an electric lamp.

A New Clerical Order. An Oxford correspondent writes: "A friend of mine, a rector in this neighborhood, told me the other day the following: He was preparing some boys for confirmation and asked one of them what were the three orders in the Church of England, to which he received the reply, 'Bishops, priests and deacons' and on my friend making him repeat his answer to it he had mistaken him the same reply was made."

Antiquity of the Boomerang. The boomerang, the Australian native's weapon of offense and defense, referred to in all reference works as an instrument unknown until after the discovery of Australia, was doubtless known before the time of Christ. Pliny the elder, a contemporary of our Saviour, writes as follows in his "Natural History" respecting an instrument made of the wood of the aquilina: "If a staff made of this wood, when thrown at an animal, from want of strength in the person, throwing falls short of the mark, it will come back toward the thrower of its own accord, so remarkable are the properties of this wood."

It is altogether probable that the learned Pliny did not consider the shape of the "staff" and referred its peculiarities to the nature of the wood of which it was made.

Perception of Fact. "What is the way to success?" we ask the great men. They cannot tell us. "They know what upheld them in every emergency, but they cannot define it. It was the sense of proportion.
