The bridge over the Seneca river is now building, connecting it with a Turnpike road to the east and west, which, with the rapid progress of the settlement in its immediate vicinity, must inevitably render it a place of the first importance in the western country.—An opportunity is now afforded for persons to purchase, who wish to settle in a growing village, or to vest their money in the purchase of property which will rapidly increase in value.
