Wright Precipitates Situation

Edwards Dairy Company. This company has owned Sam Miller as high as \$20,000 and even today Miller has put up the state bond which Edwards Dairy Company has to have to operate. Miller owns Bullock body and soul Bullock would make a good union county chairman for Miller. And the seven directors of Canton Dairies got right into the fight to promote Sam Miller's interests. This is the same little crew which have been boosting the bargaining agency and knocking the union around Canton for a couple of years.

Why has Miller got into this business of Union busting? It is because he knows a day of reckoning is coming of this Canton Dairies business. All over the milk shed Sam Miller has boasted to his milk dealer friends what a "nice thing" he had here at Canton and what a rucking he was giving Canton farmers.

This federal marketing order is a good thing for dealers, particularly dealers like Sam Miller. He has made enough out of this Canton plant to pay for it twice over, and he is still making plenty of money out of it. He puts milk through this plant for less than 10 cents a cwt. Dealers are now paying a 15 cent per cwt. bonus for surplus milk and this is in addition to the 17 cent handling charge which makes 32 cents a cwt. at the very least for Miller to play on. Out of this he can well afford to give the Canton farmers a 5 cent bonus over and above the Order price. Talk this over with your fellow farmers. It might be well to move on this Sam man for that much.

In addition to this Union dues should be paid without argument and these attacks on Carl Peters and the Farmers Union should be stopped. Moreover, if those seven directors continue to represent Sam Miller instead of the farmers who elected them, why seven new faces on that board of directors wouldn't do any harm. Think this over and when you get ready for action the old Union will be right on hand.
