Mrs. Dollinger, who has been on the Plaindealer staff the past twenty months, left Saturday morning for New York where she will meet Lieut. Dollinger, who will be on leave for several weeks.

Jane Heim, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward F. Heim, of Jay street, has been elected assistant director of the War Council at St. Lawrence. The War Council is an organization set up to enlist student aid in war activities. Miss Heim is a sophomore at the university. She has taken part in various girls athletics, and is a member of the Board of Athletic Control. The Plaindealer received a phone call from Mrs. Chester Olmstead Thursday morning as a result of the article it ran on Tuesday relative to her son, Staff Sergeant Chester Olmstead, and how the gun turret he occupied on a Liberator bomber became jammed while in action over Jap territory. Mrs. Olmstead wished to know all about how this paper procured the story, as this was the first word the family in Colton had had about or from him in many weeks. It was only possible to inform Mrs. Olmstead that the item came to this office in an official army envelope and that it was an official army release. It was, however, a pleasure to be able to supply these parents with even this rather meager information.

Harold E. Morgan, who some years ago resided here in Canton with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Morgan, died last Tuesday at his home in Unionville, near Potsdam, from heart trouble. He was 36 years of age and was born in Watertown. The family then moved to Canton where for some years the father was employed as a type compositor in The Plaindealer office and then worked at the DeGrasse Paper Mill at Pyrites. While the family was there Harold was active in athletics, being the star of the Pyrites High teams and playing ball with the Pyrites ball club, prominent in those days. Until ill health forced his retirement he had worked for the Racquette River Paper Company. On February 19, 1931, he married Irene Lawson. Her death recently occurred at Rochester under unfortunate circumstances.

Many Canton families are concerned with the progress of the invasion of France for many local men have been stationed in England in training for D-Day. For this reason information relative to what outfits are participating in the action is of especial interest. For instance, this paper is aware that Jeremy Graves, son-in-law of Dr. and Mrs. Ward C. Priest, is serving with the First Division, now announced as one of the invading forces. The First is a veteran campaign organization. It went into Africa with the invasion there, and was then called upon to invade Sicily. Jeremy Graves has been overseas about two years, has been wounded at least once and has been hospitalized four times either as the result of wounds or injuries. He has recently been stationed in England and presumably was among the forces leading the invasion of the French coast.

MESSAGE FROM WAR MANPOWER REGIONAL DIRECTOR

A special "D-Day" message to the people of New York State was issued June 6th by Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg, Regional Director of the War Manpower Commission. The message said:

"D-Day" has come—not only for the men on the invasion front, but for the home front as well. None of us can make the contribution and the sacrifice every soldier will be called on to make, but for many thousands of us, right here at home, the opportunity to show the men in the invasion what they mean to us is at hand. In every community in New York State war jobs are waiting to be filled, jobs for men, jobs for women, for the experienced and the inexperienced. Every one of these jobs, as long as they are not filled means something not done for a man on the invasion front. Every one filled means a step nearer victory.

We don't know how long the invasion will last, or what the cost will be, but surely in our hearts every one must be asking, "What can I do to help?" A war job, right now, is the answer.

"Let's work, not wait—for victory." Mrs. Anna M. Rosenberg announced that starting today, Wednesday June 7, every office of the United States Employment Service of the War Manpower Commission in New York State will remain open until 9 p.m. to interview applicants for war jobs.

The United States Employment Service at 402 Ford Street, Ogdensburg, N. Y. will remain open every evening beginning June 7 from 7 to 9 p.m.

To Armor U. S. Tanks
NEW YORK.—Four "knights" in medieval armor marched to the scrap heap for Uncle Sam.

"Boy Scouts carrying signs reading 'We fought for King Arthur and we'll fight for Uncle Sam,'" wore the armor, donated anonymously by an eastern museum.

Each outfit—steel plate helmets, buckles and greaves over chain mail, authentic replicas of 13th and 14th century armor—weighed approximately 60 pounds.

French Cathedral Organ

Looted of Pipes for Tin
BERNE, SWITZERLAND.—Four hundred and fifty pipes of the organ in Beauvais cathedral were reported to have been stolen.

Apparently the thieves entered the cathedral during the night after having acquired duplicate keys of a side door. The value of the tin in the stolen pipes was set at 3,000,000 francs.

Beauvais is in the occupied zone, where nonferrous metals are being collected for the German account.

UNUSUAL RE-ELECTION

What is described as a "rare occurrence and a signal honor" is the recent re-election of Dr. Frank B. Jewett as president of the National Academy of Sciences. His continuance is ascribed to his war work. It means that Dr. Jewett, vice-president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and formerly head of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, will also continue on the National Defense Research Committee, which plans and coordinates the war work of scientists throughout the country. Dr. Jewett is head of the Communications and Transportation Division of that body.

Stolen Power Plant

There was foul play in Fairplay, Colo., when some one walked off with the town's lighting system. Police found the system in a Denver pawnshop and apprehended two men charged with having pawned the \$1,000 town generator for \$40.
