THE SCOUTING TRAIL

1,000 VOLUNTEER WORKERS TO RAISE \$19,912

More than 1,000 volunteer workers have inaugurated the Boy Scout Finance campaign in all parts of St. Lawrence county according to Earl S. MacPadden. The drive is being conducted simultaneously in all of the communities of the county and all rural areas to secure a goal of \$19,912 to make possible the Scouting program for all boys in the county in addition to an operating budget of \$15,212 for 1950. An attempt is being made in this campaign to raise capital funds for the improvement of Camp Vigor and to make up a deficit incurred by a change of the Council's fiscal year, from Sept. 30th to the end of the year.

The council's operating budget includes such items as office rent, light, phone, office supplies, postage, office salary, executive salaries, field expense, camping, leadership training, activities, campaign expenses, insurance and organization expense.

The council has grown steadily from a membership of 298 boys in 1938 to a present membership of 1158 Scouts. Due to the lowering of the age requirements in Scouting by one year so that a boy may become a Cub Scout at 8, a Boy Scout at 11 and an Explorer at 14, the council anticipates a record growth during 1950. The only limitation on growth of the organization is the securing of enough institutions or organizations to sponsor the Boy Scout program and the selection of leaders who will be trained by the council to provide the program for the boys. This problem is being tackled by the organization and extension committee under the leadership of Edgar L. Schwartz, chairman, and it is expected that many new units will be organized during the next few months.

The Council has conducted numerous outstanding activities during the past year including a ski meet at the S. L. U. snowbowl near South Colton; an outstanding Boy Scout week celebration; an unusually successful camporee at Malou creek with a huge Scout parade at Gouverneur; a Scout rendezvous at the New York State Ranger school, where all leaders are trained for their jobs; the region 2 ski meet held at Turin; numerous district rallies and camporees; a Cub pow wow at Potsdam for all Cub Scouts; operated Camp Vigor, the summer Scout camp located on the St. Lawrence river near Morrisstown with 250 Scouts in attendance; had 11 Air Scouts at the Air Scout encampment at Stuart Field, Middletown, N. Y., and had one Scout attend the Philmont Scout ranch, located in the northeast corner of the state of New Mexico, high up in the Rocky Mountains. The Scouts have also participated in a Mt. Marcy expedition, attended a Canadian camporee held at Kingston, Ont., and are now making plans to attend the Scout day at West Point, 150 Scouts plan to leave on Friday for this big event.

During the Boy Scout week celebration, Drury Cathers of Gouverneur was selected by the region to represent Region 2 (New York and New Jersey) at special programs and activities conducted in Washington D. C. and New York city.

These highlight activities together with countless others are promoted and conducted by the council in order to motivate the entire Scouting program. The success of the campaign during the
