

Canton-Gouverneur Wrestle To Draw

Canton High school's still undefeated wrestling team will be facing their most crucial test of the season when they face another undefeated aggregation Saturday night at Watertown in the Golden Cyclones of Watertown High school.

Canton kept their season's record clean last Friday night when they made up an 18-0 deficit to tie Gouverneur Central school at Gouverneur 23-23 in a thrilling match.

Against Gouverneur some of the Canton lightweights made some serious errors and were pinned, and Gouverneur's defensive wrestling deprived the locals of some anticipated fall victories that had to be settled for with decision wins.

It was unusual to see the locals record only one pin in a match that saw them win seven of twelve individual bouts. Don Shoulette and Bill Bennett came awfully close to winning by falls, but in both instances their opponents were too near the edge of the mat, and were able to get parts of their bodies off the canvas.

Come Saturday night the Bears will have to go all out if they hope to return to the county seat with a still unblemished record, as the Cyclones have bowled over all adversaries thus far, and will be out to continue their dominance over Canton.

The Bears, however, have a chance to win if they get the pins in their best weights and go with all stops out in every bout. Watertown has not faced as still opposition as the charges of Coach Bill Hayden are expected to furnish, and in addition will have a tough bout with Gouverneur Friday night.

Last Friday night Gouverneur, very strong in the low weights, had their supporters cheering wildly as they copped the first three weights with rapid falls, and added a decision win in the fourth weight. After this opening onslaught, Canton took over control and lost only the 147 lb. class by a fall.

Trailing 18-0, Canton began the long road back, and a terrific job was turned in by the locals who knew it was produce now or never. Rog Darrah started it with a decision win in the 129 lb. event, and his example was followed by Joe Gratto at 135 lbs., Don Shoulette at 140 lbs., Dick Rowan at 167 lbs., Loren Aldrich at 178 lbs., and Bill Bennett at the unlimited. Fran Butler recorded Canton's only fall win with a pin at 0:54 of the second period in his match with Gladie at 154 lbs.

Bill Bennett in the heavyweight class really had the pressure on him as he went out for the final match with the Bears trailing 23-20, and due to nervousness fell behind on points 3-1. As the third period got underway Bennett opened up the throttle and went after Campbell of Gouverneur with a vengeance and was soon ahead 5-3.

Bennett came very close to a fall victory as he had Campbell pinned in the third stanza, but the referee ruled that Campbell was off the mat. The Canton matman showed plenty of spirit and aggressiveness and looked the best he has all season in saving the day for the local grapplers.

Coach Olle Kollevoll had his St. Lawrence hockey team back at work today, determined to make up for Saturday's defeat by Boston Collete with a new victory Sunday beginning with Queens here on Saturday. The Larries had won seven in a row before the Eagles topped them, 5-1, to scramble the eastern college hockey picture.

Coach Kollevoll commended his players for their efforts against Boston's supercharged sextet last weekend. "Our team skated hard right down to the wire," Kollevoll said "but it just wasn't our night to score goals. We outshot them, 28 to 20, but they took advantage of every scoring opportunity and their goalie, D'Entremont, stopped at least ten good shots of ours. Their defenseman, Bob Kiley, was an all-American here Saturday, and he personally broke up a lot of our rood rushes."

St. Lawrence still had a chance for victory down to the 19-minute mark, with the score at 3-1 and the Larries applying most of the pressure to the tiring Eagles. "If one of Burk's shots had gone in, we might have pulled the same out," Kollevoll said. Bob Burk, defenseman, fired three blistering shots at D'Entremont in the closing minutes, but the Eagle-goalie made outstanding saves on all of them.

In this week's practice, Coach Kollevoll had Joe DiClementi skating at left wing with Chet Stefanowicz at center and Red Karlan at right wing. DiClementi will become eligible for varsity play with the beginning of the new semester, and the Montreal ace should help the Larries in their stretch drive against strong Tri-State League opponents, Clarkson, Middlebury and R. F. I. Some players missed practice because of final examinations which are going on this week, but the whole squad will get a good workout before the Queen's game on Saturday.

Kollevoll's players refused to be counted out of contention for eastern championship honors. They showed as much hustle and spirit in practice today as they have ever shown, and there was an air of businesslike determination around Appleton Arena which could not be denied. Chet Stefanowicz spoke for the team when he said, "we played a good team Saturday, and we lost. Now we have to beat all the Tri-State League teams."

Muskrat Season Opens March 1st In North

Following an analysis of muskrat population surveys conducted by District Game Managers and Game Research men of the Department's Bureau of Game, Conservation Commissioner Perry B. Duryea today announced the establishment of the 1954 muskrat trapping season in New York.

Commissioner Duryea stated that this year's season would open in the Northern Zone March 1 and continue through April 10, while in the Southern trapping zone the season is set for the period February 1 through March 10.

The Commissioner pointed out, however, that these seasons can be extended for a limited period if abnormal trapping conditions prevent an adequate harvest of the muskrat fur crop.

Details of the 1954 muskrat season announced by the Commissioner and as set forth in the Conservation Department Order, follows:

1. Open season, Northern zone. Except in the county of Washington where there shall be no open season, in that part of the State east and north of the Oswego River from Lake Ontario to its junction with the Oneida River, Oneida River to Oneida Lake, north shore of Oneida Lake to the Barge Canal, Barge Canal to Rome—the main line tracks of the New York Central Railroad Company from Rome to Albany, and north of the main line tracks of the Boston and Albany Railroad Company from Albany to the Massachusetts boundary, the open season for muskrats shall begin March 1 and shall continue through April 10.

2. Open Season, South Zone. In that part of the State west and south of the boundary lines described in paragraph 1 above, the open season for muskrats shall begin February 1 and shall continue through March 10.

Trapping Hours. On the opening day of the season in each one no persons shall set, stake or place a trap or deadfall prior to 7:00 a.m. Eastern Standard Time. Thereafter during the open season deadfalls and legal traps may be set, staked and placed at any time, day or night.

This year's Department Muskrat Trapping Order takes effect February 1, 1954 and continues in force and effect until revoked.
