Mrs. Minnie Dawson, 78, passed away at her home on the Bell Road, Heuvelton, Monday night. She had been in her usual health until she was suddenly stricken about supper time Monday.

Mrs. Dawson was born Feb. 25, 1878, in Stewardville, Ont., the daughter of the late Donald Watt and Mary Elizabeth MacIntyre. She attended the schools in Ontario and on Feb. 25, 1893, she was married to Charles H. Dawson in Renfrew, Ont. The couple lived there until 1900 when they moved to their home on the Bell Road. Mr. Dawson died Feb. 5, 1915.

Mrs. Dawson was a member of the Presbyterian Church, Heuvelton, and the Ladies Aid of that church.
