

N. Y. Legislature—April 16.

The bill imposing a tax on each dollar of assessed value in New York and extraordinary repairs of canals was taken up and debated at some length. After a long debate the bill was ordered to a third reading, and the appropriation to the Genesee Valley Canal being increased from \$30,000 to \$100,000, the Committee then took up the bill to levy a tax of one-eighth of a mill on a dollar to pay the canal awards. The bill was read and passed.

ASSEMBLY.—It appearing that William A. Cobb, Cyrus Curtis and William C. Henderson, witnesses summoned to appear before the Commerce Committee in the investigation of the case of the Marina Hospital, refused to appear, a resolution was adopted and that they brought before the bar of the House.

Bills passed: Designating days to be observed as holidays with regard to the payment of notes, making them payable the day after.

The House then went into Committee on the general State tax bill.

Mr. Cavanagh moved to strike out of the bill the \$300,000 loaned by the Manhattan Company to go on with the work on the new State Capitol.

Mr. Jacobs stated that the Governor and Comptroller had, without sanction of law, assumed the responsibility of borrowing this money, deeming it necessary.

Mr. Littlejohn said he believed the Governor and Comptroller had done wrong in borrowing this money, but he would now vote for paying it. He further stated that the Ways and Means Committee had already prepared a section in the supply bill providing that hereafter if any State officer shall go beyond an appropriation on any State work, he shall be held personally liable.

Mr. Cavanagh withdrew his amendment.

Mr. Ray moved to reduce the tax so as to raise money to pay the loan, and not raise any money to continue the work.

The proposition to pay this indebtedness and against appropriating any more money to the construction of the new Capitol were discussed, when the committee rose and reported progress.

Mr. Jacobs then proposed that the bill be amended, as reported by Mr. Littlejohn, and then ordered to a third reading. Carried.

Miscellaneous.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—Supervisor Emory, of Tennessee, reports that since the 30th of June 1869, the following number of stills, mash-tubs, etc., have been destroyed by revenue officers in their attempts to suppress illicit distillation: Seventy-two stills and mash-tubs, and eighty-seven mash-tubs, and about 150 gallons of whisky. The estimated value of which is about \$8,000.

The following has just been issued: HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, WASHINGTON, April 15, 1870. General Orders No. 41.

By direction of the President of the United States, the following changes in the departments and commanders are hereby announced:

First. Major-General J. M. Schofield is assigned to the command of the Military Division of the Pacific, his headquarters to be at San Francisco, California.

Second. The Department of Alaska, will be discontinued after the 1st of July, 1870, and the Territory will be attached to the Department of the Columbia, to the command of which Brevet Major-General E. R. S. Canby, is assigned, the headquarters to be at Portland, Oregon.

Third. A new department is hereby created to be attached to the Department of Arizona, to embrace the territory of that name, and a line from the north-west corner of Arizona to Point Conception, the headquarters to be at Prescott or Fort Whipple for Arizona, and Colonel and Brevet Major-General George Stoneman is assigned the command according to his brevet rank of Major-General.

Fourth. Brevet Major-General John M. Schofield is assigned to the command of the Department of Missouri, when vacated by General Schofield, and will establish the headquarters of the Department at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Fifth. The department of the Lakes, after the 1st of June, will be enlarged so as to embrace the northern frontier as far east as Lake Champlain, with headquarters at Detroit, Mich., and Brigadier and Major General P. St. George Cook is assigned to the command.

Sixth. After June 1st the Depart-

ment of Virginia will be discontinued, and the territory and troops therein will be attached to and form part of the Department of the East, Brevet Major-General J. McDowell commanding, with headquarters in New York City.

Seventh. The Department of the Cumberland will be discontinued after June first, and the territory and troops therein will be attached to and form part of the Department of the South, Brevet Major-General Terry commanding, with headquarters at Atlanta, Georgia.

Eighth. The officers of the general staff, serving in the departments that are hereby discontinued, after closing their records and accounts, will report by letter to the headquarters of the Army for re-assignment to duty. By command of GEN. SHERMAN, E. D. TOWNSEND, Adjutant General.

Public business in Congress was never before so much in arrears as at present. After four months and a half of session, perhaps never before were so many bills introduced and resolutions of inquiry adopted. Seven-eighths of the former, at least, are in the several committees. Action has been taken on many of them, but opportunity to report them has not been afforded. No one thinks of ending the session before the first of July, in view of the large amount of business to be transacted.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—General Rosecrans does not seem to have much prospect of success before the committee with his schemes in Mexico, nor with the government of that country either.

Nothing whatever has done with regard to re-opening the "Alabama" claims in this city. Our Government will probably await the movement of Great Britain in the premises.

The official information of the apprehended Fenian designs is received, but nothing tangible on which the Government can act.

The international meeting of the South American Republic, through their representatives, will take place in May, the object being to arrange the terms of peace on a basis suggested by the former Secretary of State, Mr. Seward.

Spain is interested in the arrangement in connection with Peru and Chili.

NEW YORK, April 16.—The question of establishing a cotton exchange in this city, is being canvassed among our cotton merchants.

Small pox is raging very extensively at Greenport, Long Island.

Commodore Meade was struck with paralysis, to-day, and taken to the city hospital. Later in the day his death was announced.

A verdict of \$15,000 was recovered against Adams' Express for the value of a large number of peaches intended for New York, left at Fortress Monroe, in 1867.

General Stone, of Massachusetts, sailed to-day to take an important command in the Egyptian army.

Hon. Elliott C. Cowdin, Collector Grinnell, Colonel Frank F. Howe and Leonard Jerome, representing the Government, the Union League and the Chamber of Commerce, will receive the remains of Anson Burlingame upon arrival, and escort them to the Boston boat, where they will be given in the charge of a delegation of Massachusetts officials.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 16.—An agent of the Tennessee Company of Planters, who was sent to China to procure laborers for the South, returned by the steamer "America." It is said that his mission was unsuccessful.

The remains of Josh Silsbee, the comedian, were removed from Yerba Buena cemetery yesterday. The coffin was opened and the body found to be in a perfect state of preservation although it has been buried fifteen years.

INDIANAPOLIS, April 16.—Five inches of snow have fallen here since six o'clock this morning, and it is still snowing.

Foreign.

HALIFAX, April 16.—Mr. Murray's resolutions were discussed to-day.

The address to the imperial government contains the following questions: Whether the Dominion will be allowed, if desirous, to become independent? and again, Whether Nova Scotia, if desirous, would be allowed to become independent alone.

The Attorney General in commenting on the resolutions, expressed the belief that independence must lead to annexation.

COPENHAGEN, April 17.—General Roasloff, Minister of War, has tendered his resignation to the King, in consequence of the failure of the treaty for the sale of the island of St. Thomas to the United States.

MADRID, April 16.—The Republican journals of Spain demand the separation of Church and State, and that all priests or Bishops refusing to take the oath to the constitution be sent to Rome.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 17.—The City Auditor refuses to audit the demand for \$15,000 appropriated for the free Catholic schools of this city, as there are no unappropriated funds in the City Treasury, nor are there likely to be.

The total yield of quicksilver on this coast for 1869 was 16,898 flasks.

Mr. Delong, Minister to Japan, threatens to resign, unless Congress makes that mission one of the first class.
