

# Sell Out Crowd Sure at All Star Game Tomorrow

Cincinnati, July 5.—(AP)—The crowds of baseball have started pouring in on this troubled town for tomorrow's annual all-star game between the two major leagues, and by this nightfall there will be a honerun knocker behind every potted palm in the hotel lobbies.

Cincinnati, frankly isn't as joyous in expectation of the big event as had been anticipated a few days ago. The Reds have lost their last six games. If the incoming stars fail to encounter a welcoming crowd at the much-bemoaned Union station, they will understand what has happened.

Still, a sell-out crowd of 28,000, including 2,000 standees, is assured when the two star-spangled outfits meet at 1:30 (Eastern Standard Time) tomorrow afternoon at Crosley Field. All the reserved chairs were sold while the community still was suffering with pennant fever and when Johnny Vander Meer looked like being the next city manager.

Now the good burghers suddenly clear-headed again, realize they aren't going to see a world series next autumn, and it is a little sad. About all they hope for tomorrow's turnover is that their lovely Vander Meer will outpitch Bobby Feller of Cleveland for the first three innings.

It will be a crime against the sovereign state of Ohio if the two youngsters aren't given the lead-off assignments. They probably will be, but it would cause no great shock to many observers if Joe McCarthy, manager-for-a-day of the American League beauties, led with either Lefty Gomez or Red Ruffing of his own Yankees.

McCarthy and his National League rival, Bill Terry, will get together with Commissioner Landis and the umpires tonight for a final ironing-out of the details. Neither manager will see his full team until they all meet at the clubhouse at 11 o'clock on the morning of the game.

Terry, weighed with the task of trying to give the National League its second victory in six all-star games, isn't going to receive very encouraging news here. Frank McCormick of the Reds, the only first baseman on the National squad, has hit a terrific batting slump and has made three glaring errors in as many days. Evidently he had made only one miscue for almost half the playing season.

Outside of the probable starting pitchers, most of the conjectures binges on the man to play third base for the National Leaguers—whether it will be Mel Ott, Glantz slugger, or Stanley Hack of the Chicago Cubs. Hack is the more finished fielder, but with hitting power at such a premium in one "sudden death" game there is a possibility that Terry will post Ott at the last turn.

The possibility also is suggested that McCarthy will plant Lou Gehrig on first base and send Jimmie Foxx over to third in order to cram all the power possible into his American League infield. This, though is discounted, because Gehrig at present is hitting far under his best form. The Americans have a fine third baseman in Red Rolfe, anyway.

It practically is certain that the Nationals will open with Leo Durocher of Brooklyn at shortstop, despite the fact he can't hit a lick. His great defensive skill gives him the nod over Arkie Vaughan of Pittsburgh, a superior hitter, in the opinion of the experts.

# Compromise on Grade Crossing Plan Is Talked

Albany, July 5.—(AP)—Fast mounting opposition to a proposal requiring the state to pay all grade crossing elimination costs today forced constitutional convention advocates to talk "compromise" in a bid for more support.

A spokesman said proponents, fearful their proposal is too "drastic," are considering an amendment under which the railroads would still share some of the financial burden but on a reduced scale of from 15 to 25 per cent as compared to their present 50 per cent and the localities one.

This development came as the convention delegates, moving into their 14th week tonight, prepared to debate the Republican-authored measure along with several other proposals destined to provoke bitter debate along political lines.

As advocates of the grade crossing plan considered a "compromise," Chairman Mto R. Malbie of the Public Service Commission took a stand similar to that of Democratic Governor Lehman in calling for its rejection on the ground it would "greatly add to present financial difficulties."

"There is already in the state budget a debt service item of \$5,000,000 for interest and amortization in railroad grade crossing bonds of \$100,000,000 (issued since 1915)," Malbie said. "If the proposal is enacted, the increased tax levies necessitated to cover interest and amortization will, during the early years, approximate \$15,000,000."

"Do the taxpayers of the State of New York, already heavily burdened, wish to have shifted from the railroads a large additional amount?"

Malbie gave the commission's opinion at the request of Republican Delegate-at-Large Abbot Low Moffat, who with Democratic Delegate Charles Folert led the opposition. The proposal was offered by Republican Delegate Robert Moses with the support of former Democratic Governor Alfred E. Smith.

Republican leaders stated the heaviest week's calendar since the convention opened April 5, and insisted upon night sessions until the various measures are disposed of.

In addition to the controversial grade crossing proposal, discussion will center on these:

(1) The Republican formula to outlaw unreasonable property seizures and wire-tapping without banning court use of illegally obtained evidence, moved to order of final passage last week after defeat of a Democratic plan which included the evidence ban.

(2) A proposal to remove the state's constitutional gambling ban, leaving the question of

authorization or prohibition to the Legislature.

(3) A measure designed to authorize state funds for denominational school bus transportation now available for only public institutions.

Adoption of the "search and seizure" proposal as the first of the convention is considered a formality, inasmuch as the Republican majority easily killed the Democratic plan and advanced its own last week.

Numerous committee meetings are slated for the week—the last in which proposals may either be reported to the floor for debate or pigeon-holed. After July 12, no measure may be reported for debate unless with unanimous consent of the 168 delegates.

Malbie, in putting the Public Service Commission on record against the grade crossing plan, presented a chart showing the total estimated cost of eliminations ordered since the issuance of \$300,000,000 in bonds for that purpose in 1925 is approximately \$137,000,000, of which \$64,795,566 involves the New York Central Railroad.

He cautioned that adoption of a measure exempting the railroads from elimination costs would "invite waste and extravagance."

"Under the present plan," the commission chairman said, "the railroads' operating expenditures which are not necessary and at times favor plans which are too narrowly designed. But remove this restrictive incentive, transfer the entire cost to the state and the railroads will favor more grandiose and elaborate plans."

Localities likewise would demand elimination of all grade crossings in their areas if their one per cent charge was lifted, Malbie added.
