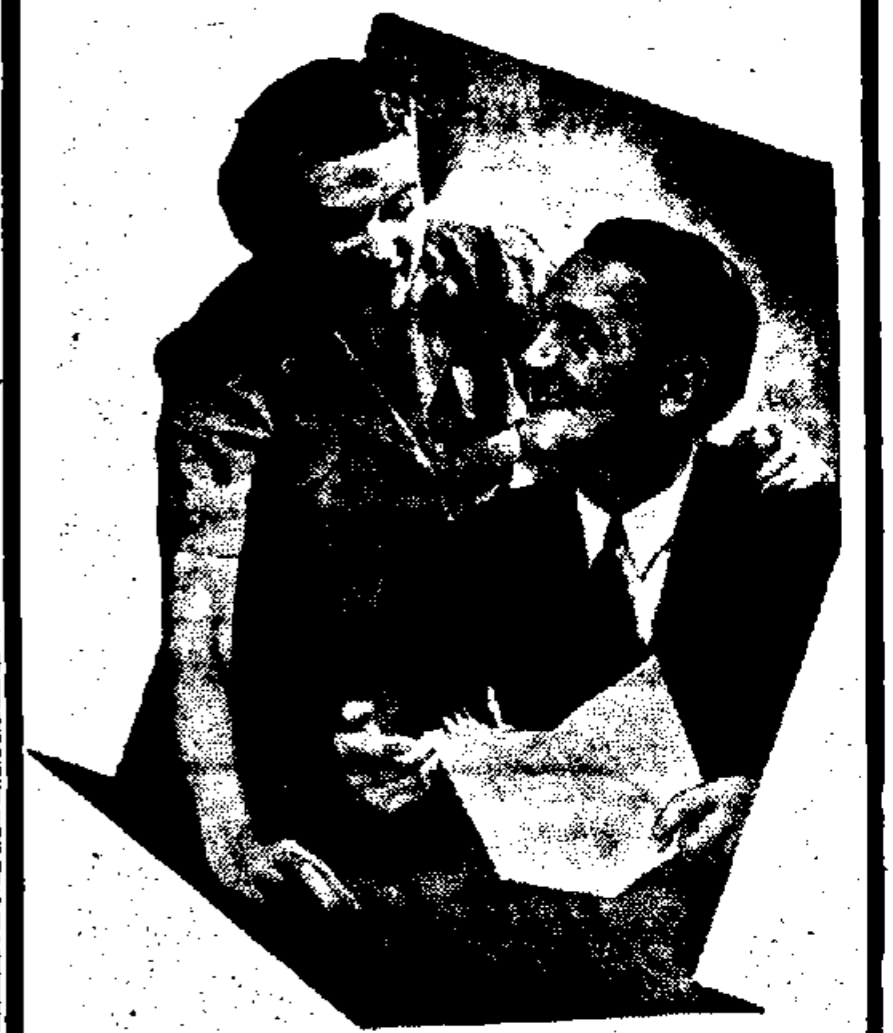
### RAYFIELD QUINN, 58, CAYUGA, DIES

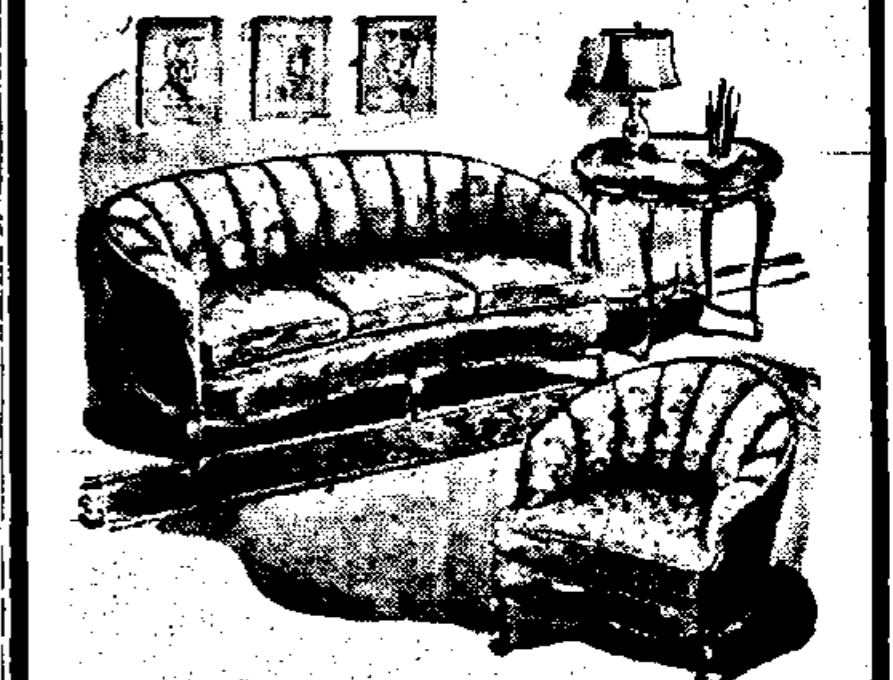

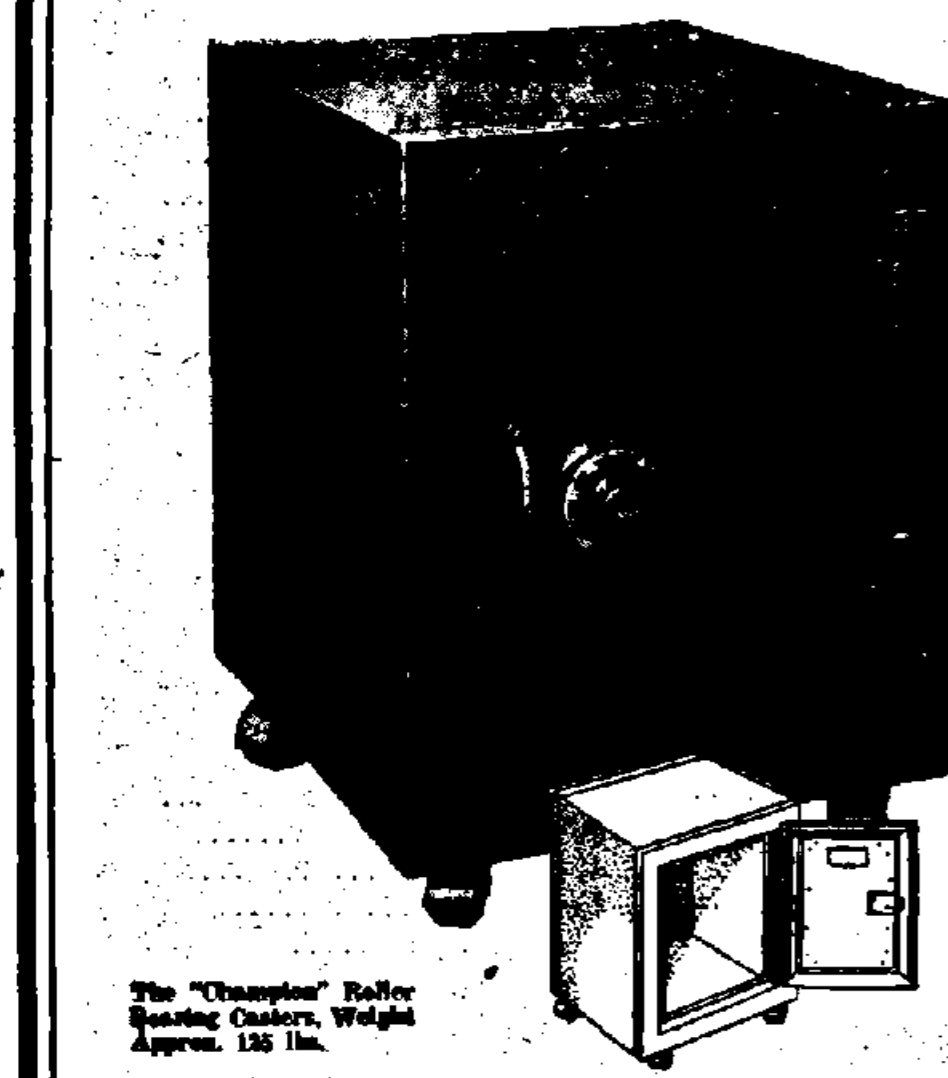

### Joseph Marshall Burial Rites in Union Springs

(Washington Post, July 2) Funeral services for Joseph Marshall, new House Office Building employe, and veteran of the battle of Manila Bay, and of the Boxer Rebellion, who died suddenly in the House Office Building in Washington Saturday, will be held Friday in Union Springs, N. Y. Burial will be in Union Springs.

Mr. Marshall, a native of Petaluma, Calif., served in the Navy as crew member of a ship in Admiral Dewey's fleet during the liberation of the Philippines in 1898. Subsequently he fought during the Boxer Rebellion. He was discharged from the Navy in 1902. Mr. Marshall studied at Columbia University, and during the last war was employed as an electrical engineer by the Andes Copper Co., at Chancas, Chile. He remained there for 10 years.

Mr. Marshall leaves his wife, Mrs. Muriel Abbott Marshall, and one daughter, Miss Elizabeth Marshall, of San Francisco.

**Wife Was In Union Springs**  
Mrs. Joseph Marshall arrived in Union Springs from Washington Monday, June 25, to prepare the Marshall summer home in South Cayuga Street for occupancy. Last Saturday afternoon she received a telegram stating that her husband had died suddenly from a heart attack that day while at his duties in the House Office Building in Washington.

Mr. Marshall was in his usual good health when his wife left and planned to join her soon in Union Springs. Mrs. Marshall left at once for Washington. The body of Mr. Marshall arrived in Union Springs on the 8:30 train this morning. Services will be held at the home at 2 o'clock on Friday and at 2:30 o'clock at Grace Episcopal Church. Burial will be in Chestnut Hill Cemetery. The deceased had spent many summers in Union Springs and had many friends there.
