ELKS PLEDGE AID IN FREEING OATIS

Lodge Sends Resolution to President Truman—Vote Unanimous

Auburn Lodge of Elks sent to President Harry S. Truman last night a resolution pledging their support of the strongest measures which may be necessary to free William N. Oatis. Associated Press correspondent held prisoner in Czechoslovakia.

Mr. Oatis is held by the communist government of that country on charges of espionage. His arrest, trial, and conviction, have been widely protested throughout the non-communist world as an act of injustice.

Seventy-five Elks unanimously voted in favor of the resolution at last night's regular meeting.

The resolution was signed by Edward J. Jennings, exalted ruler, and J. Edward Maloney, secretary. It was presented by Charles E. Bergan, district deputy, and seconded by Clarence S. Hunt, past district deputy.

Trial Biased
Here is what the resolution said:

WHEREAS, the arrest, trial, and conviction of William N. Oatis, an American citizen, by the communist dictators of Czechoslovakia was a travesty of justice by any civilized standards, and an obvious propaganda effort designed to embarrass the United States of America, and

WHEREAS, William N. Oatis became a victim of communist oppression while performing his duties as the chief of the Associated Press Bureau in Prague, which duties were to obtain factual news and report it, and

WHEREAS, William N. Oatis was arrested in secret, kept incommunicado, and denied opportunity to have counsel of his own choosing, and the representative of the United States has been re-

Strike of Bronx Workers Spreads

New York, Oct. 4.—(AP)—A strike of Bronx apartment house workers spread to another 450 buildings today, making a total of 900 buildings without heat, hot water or elevator service.

Thomas F. Lewis, president of AFL Building Service Workers, Local 32-E, threatened further extension tomorrow of the two-day-old strike, which has deprived thousands of residents of maintenance services.

Representatives of the union and the landlord group, the Bronx Realty Advisory Board, agreed last night to meet tomorrow in State Mediation Board

offices. But if agreement is not reached by tomorrow, the union says, a total of 1,300 Bronx buildings will be without vital services. That figure represents the great part of major Bronx apartment houses.

Wage and hour demands and present scales were not made public, but one report has the union seeking a 15 per cent pay boost. Also, the union demands that employers observe a minimum in reducing staffs in structures converting from coal to oil heat.

The union contract expired September 15 but was extended to last Monday.

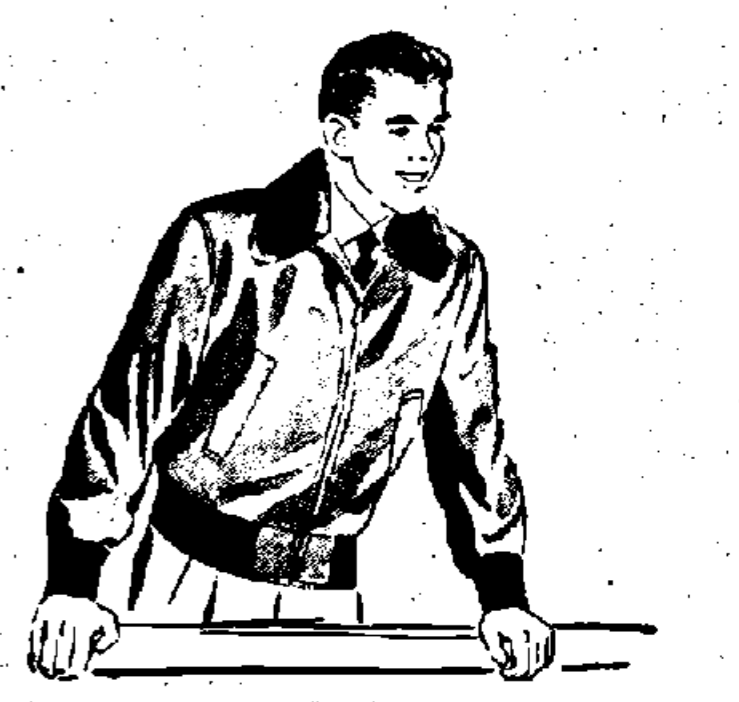
