## Cayuga Baptist Association Holds Its Annual Meeting

The Rev. Robert S. Kemp is Moderator—The Rev. Robert L. Clingan Named Moderator For Coming Year—Immanuel Church Asked To Reconsider Withdrawal Move

At the annual meeting of the Cayuga Baptist Association held Tuesday at the Moravia Baptist Church, morning, afternoon and evening sessions were devoted to frank discussions of current problems, inside information on denominational projects and resources, doctrinal instruction and pleasant sociability.

The moderator, the Rev. Robert S. Kemp, guided the deliberations and turned the organization over to the new moderator, the Rev. Robert L. Clingan, pastor of Genoa Federated Church, at the end of the day.

Other officers chosen are: vice moderator, the Rev. Charles B. Allnut of the Fleming Baptist Church, who was also chosen to preach the sermon at next year's meeting in Fleming, with the Rev. Ward H. Crawford, of Bennett Federated Church, as his alternate; secretary-treasurer, Mrs. John E. Smith; chairman of standing committees are William B. Dunning Sr., stewardship; the Rev. W. H. Crawford, Christian education; evangelism, the Rev. Warren Harris of Fort Byron Federated Church; social action, the Rev. R. S. Kemp, of Meridian; missionary and ordination, the Rev. C. B. Allnut, with Pastors W. Harris, R. S. Kemp, Sampson, and Mrs. J. E. Smith. Delegates to the state convention are Pastors Harris and Crawford.

Special Committee A special committee formulated a motion to the effect that Immanuel Baptist Church of Auburn be asked to reconsider with prayer its desire to withdraw from the association, and to state its reasons if the action is adhered to.

The Rev. Ivan Cash of Syracuse told of progress in raising salary levels of New York State town and country pastors. "One hundred churches pay less than \$1,500 a year to their ministers," he said. "We are hoping to make the minimum \$2,000."

He told of a young pastor who attended Green Lake Pastor's Conference for much-needed training in spite of warnings that

he would "hear nothing but a lot of modernism" and found instead such practical help and inspiration. "Churches which make surveys of the needs of their communities are finding new interest and new life developing," he declared, citing actual instances. Later he gave many cases of assistance given pastors and their families in financial difficulties by the Ministers' and Missionaries' Benefit Board, outside of the regular insurance plan.

The Rev. Joseph H. Sutcliffe in his sermon defined the "spiritual man" as "one who maintains a high sense of values, whose life tallies with his Bible, who seeks to unite Christians instead of separating them, who tries to understand why others differ instead of insisting on his own rigid interpretations."

The Rev. E. Byron Smith presented the needs of the Upstate Baptist Home for Children at Onondaga, and the Rev. Charles B. Allnut was chosen for three years to direct local support of the Home, which takes children from 6 to 12 whose parents have parted, and keeps them until they are able to make their own way.

Mrs. Ann Farrant, president of the Women's Missionary Society, introduced the Rev. Bailey B. Hathaway, of Addison, N. Y., to speak instead of his wife, who was to have told of their service in the Belgian Congo field. He gave many amusing incidents to show what missionaries have to learn to avoid misunderstandings, both of themselves and of the gospel message. Evening devotions were led by Claire Hagin of Genoa, Miss Marilyn Hudson of Auburn, and Philip Smith of Bennett. The address by the Rev. James Eldridge, pastor of Memorial Baptist Church, Cortland, was an exposition of St. Paul's epistle to the Romans, especially his exhortation to live sacrificially, devoted to the will of God for ourselves and for the world. Morning and afternoon devotions were led by the Rev. Charles B. Allnut and by Miss Lucy Aldrich, of Moravia. Members of the Moravia choir provided special music. The Rev. Charles M. Walker, the new pastor of Roosevelt Memorial Baptist Church, sang a spiritual, "Let Me Walk Close to Thee." Resolutions of appreciation of the gracious hospitality of the Moravia church were adopted.

## HARRIMAN HITS IKE'S CAMPAIGN

W. Averell Harriman, Mutual Security Administrator, closed his remarks at the Democratic headquarters on Exchange St. yesterday with a blast at Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Representative John Taber.

"Candidate Eisenhower is conducting a policy of falsehood and smear," the former Mutual Security Administrator said at the late afternoon meeting. In continuing his attack on the former general of the armies, Harriman attacked Eisenhower's stand on military spending. "The people who are spending out defense appropriations—35 per cent of the federal budget—are friends of Eisenhower's. He promoted some of them. How can he say now that there is mismanagement in the defense department?" Mr. Harriman said. "John Taber is the most even tempered man in Congress; he's always angry," Mr. Harriman said, in discussing the Auburn congressman. After the speech Mr. Harriman answered the questions of local Democrats, and then continued to Rochester and Buffalo on his tour of upstate New York.

## LOCAL FARMERS WILL JOURNEY TO SYRACUSE

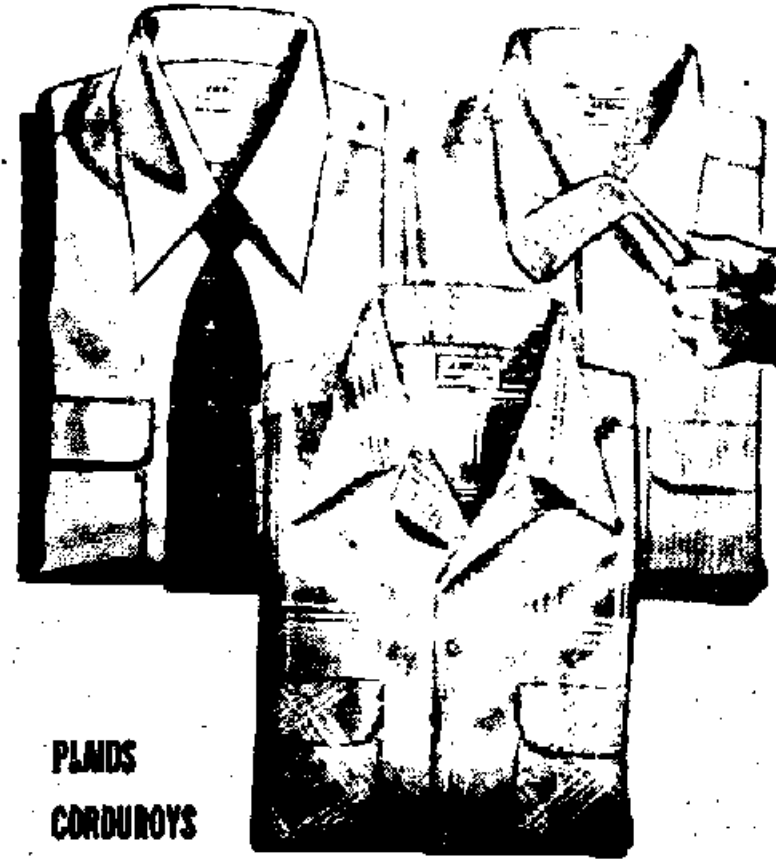

## Local Students Get 2 Days Off

Local schools will be closed tomorrow and Monday. They will close tomorrow to permit teachers to attend the 187th annual meeting of the Central Zone of the New York State Teachers Association in Utica. The schools will close Monday in observance of Columbus Day, which falls on Sunday. Malcolm H. Reed, secretary of the Auburn Board of Education, said today that approximately 450 teachers from Auburn and Cayuga County was expected to go to Utica for the meeting. Two hundred fifteen of the teachers will be from Auburn.

## Gas Firm Notes 100 Years Here

The Auburn branch of the New York State Electric and Gas Corp. will take part in a series of festivities celebrating 100 years of public service on Oct. 22. Auburn celebrations will be directed by William J. Duffy, records supervisor. Among the events of the day will be ground-breaking ceremonies at 15 miles north of Ithaca, where the company plans to construct a 500,000-kilowatt steam electric generating station. The ground breaking will be followed by a luncheon at the Ithaca Hotel for industrialists, businessmen, and civic leaders from the Ithaca-Auburn area. Auburn is one of four cities in the company's present area with gas service dating back 100 years. Others are Ithaca, Elmira and Lockport.

## Two Postoffices Will Reopen Soon

The branch (post office) on Exchange and State Streets which have been closed temporarily, will open again shortly, according to an announcement made recently by Acting Postmaster George F. Train. The Exchange St. postoffice has closed for approximately a week, and the State St. postoffice since June. Postmaster Train said that he was making arrangements with Washington so that the branch postoffices could be reopened. "We've received some bids, which have been sent to Washington for processing. They should be back soon," he said.
