

## 2 People Injured in Crash Sunday Near Port Byron

Two people were injured in a one-car crash Sunday afternoon on Township Road about one mile west of Port Byron, the Sheriff's Department reported.

James L. Grant, 49, of Savannah, was reported in satisfactory condition at Auburn Memorial Hospital with possible fractured ribs, attendants said. Another passenger in the car, Miss Mary L. Chisholm, 19, of Geneva, suffered facial cuts and lacerations.

Deputies, who gave the following account:

The driver of the car, George Grantling, 33, of Savannah, said he was heading east on Township Rd. at a moderate speed. He met another car and pulled off the right side of the road. The car hit a ditch sustaining minor damage.

Mr. Grantling was arrested on a public intoxication charge. He appeared before Meitz Peace Justice Alex VanDitto who dismissed the case. Deputies Frank Green and Kenneth Hubbard investigated about 3 p. m.

A car struck a tractor on Rockefeller Road north of Moravia late Saturday afternoon, deputies reported. No one was injured. Deputies gave the following account:

Robert R. Koons, 35, of Moravia said he was proceeding north and started to pass a tractor operated by Willard S. Moss Jr., 21, also of Moravia.

The right front of the Koons car caught the left rear wheel of the tractor. Mr. Moss said he was preparing to turn into a driveway. Both vehicles sustained minor damage. Deputy Orville Burghman investigated. The accident occurred about 5:45 p. m.

## Meeting Set on Proposed Owasco Fire Station

Town of Owasco residents will get a look tomorrow night at the third proposal for a fire station. They previously turned down two more expensive proposals.

A public hearing will be held at 7:30 p. m. at Sacred Heart School. The referendum will be held from 7 to 10 p. m. July 12 at the Bristol Ave. town hall.

To Cost \$48,000

The Board of Commissioners estimated the cost of the proposed building at \$48,000, for an increase of the tax rate at 50 to 55 cents a \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

The previous plans called for a combination fire station, town hall and community center, but the latter are omitted in the present plans.

At a public hearing Oct. 13, 1958, residents disapproved a \$200,000 building. The committee in charge drew up another set of plans for a building costing about \$83,000. The voters rejected this in a referendum held Nov. 12 of last year.

The architect, R. S. Richards, who drew up the other plans, drew up the latest proposed building in part from the original plans turned down last year. The building has been cut in size, to about 60x50 feet.

The site would be the same as first planned — about 13 1/2 acres given by the Emerson Foundation, lying between Letchworth and Owasco Streets. It has a 600 foot frontage on Owasco Street and is part of the old Pearson farm.

The new plan has the backing and support of the fire department, being adequate for present and immediate needs of the future, according to the Board of Commissioners.

The board says that present facilities on Bristol Ave. are "completely inadequate to satisfy the present needs. As it stands today, one valuable piece of equipment must remain outside exposed to the weather and suffer through our winter storms. Aside from the fact that this hastens the depreciation and, often times the equipment would not be available for use as a result of this exposure."

The Board says the new building is "badly needed and is in keeping with the future growth of the Town of Owasco."

Due to the excellence of our volunteer fire department, we are enjoying reduced insurance rates. This building will further assure our continued low rates.

The board added that "it is questionable whether building costs will be any lower in the future than they are at the present time."

The one-story building would consist of a 40x60 foot apparatus room; a 20x36 foot general purpose room; a 9x17 foot kitchen; and heater and rest rooms. The volunteer fire auxiliary would equip the kitchen.

The brick and block building would rest on concrete foundations. It would have concrete floor framing and the roof framing would consist of steel joists and steel deck or precast concrete. It would contain a 20-year bonded roof. Windows would be of aluminum or steel, doors of wood, floors of vinyl plastic tile or concrete and ceilings would be fire resistant.

**State Revokes Brokers Permit in Syracuse**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — A Syracuse real-estate broker's license has been revoked by the state because the oil company he controlled allegedly misrepresented an investment offering.

State Secretary Caroline K. Simon announced the action against Anthony Frank Matherson Sunday.

Mrs. Simon said Matherson controlled the Federal Petroleum Lease Co., which last year advertised in Upstate newspapers that it was offering "for only \$100 in public investment a 'steady lifetime income of thousands of dollars in monthly checks.'"

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ture," said Matherson had "demonstrated untrustworthiness" to act as a real-estate broker.



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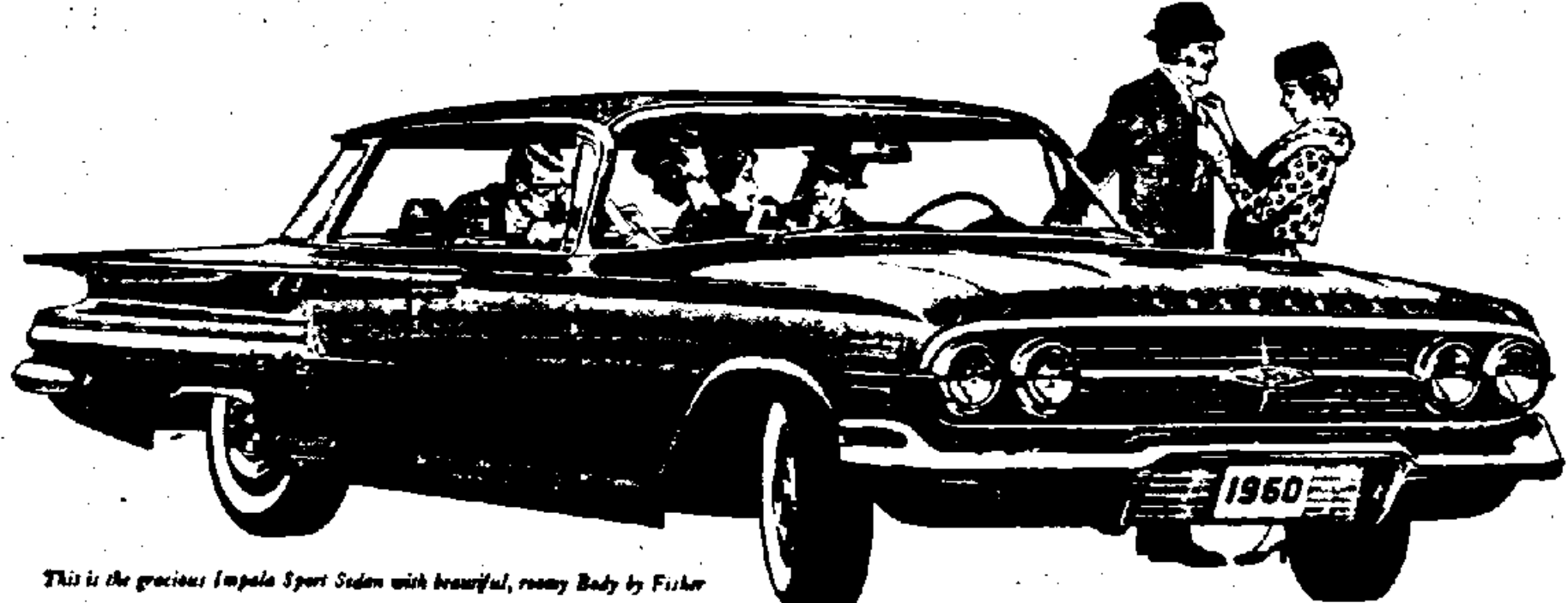
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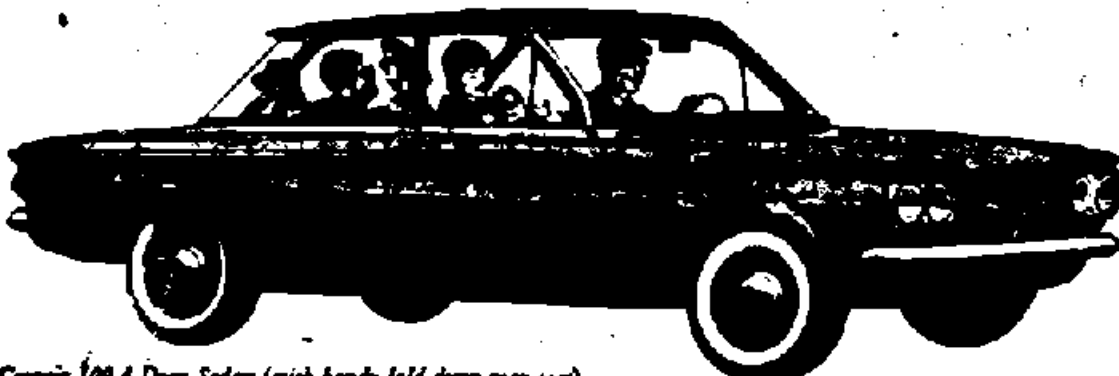
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
