

Fireworks Bring Arrests

The cases of two Auburn youths and a man charged with illegal possession of fireworks were adjourned to July 18 pending further investigation today in Recorder's Court.

Michael Quigley, 18, of 27 Elm St., and Michael Ford, 18, 11 Sumner St., were arrested on Monday at 12:10 p. m. by Patrolman John A. Malandrucolo on E. Genesee St. on a charge of possessing fireworks and shooting them off, police said.

Philip Lyons, 26, 68 Fitch Ave., was arrested by Patrolman Peter Kilian on the same charge at 9:45 a. m. Monday. Mr. Lyons had a supply of firecrackers, roman candles and salutes in his store, police said. Patrolman Donald Stenard insisted in the arrest.

July Gives Every Appearance Of Being Year's Low Point

NEW YORK (AP) — July is starting with every sign of being the year's low point in industry. Some think August will see a good recovery. Others say we'll have to wait until September for much of a gain.

The recreation and travel industries will boom this month and the suppliers of gasoline, tires, clothing, food and recreation equipment for hordes of vacationists will flourish.

But in many mills and factories output will be sharply cut—some because of vacation shutdowns of their own, but more because of a drop in incoming orders.

Steelmen fear that the ratio of output to capacity this month may dip into the 40s and average somewhere in the 50s.

The trade publication, Iron Age, says all hopes have faded for setting a record in production this year to top the 117 million tons of 1955. When 1960 started, most steel executives were confidently predicting a record this year at 125 to 130 million tons.

Mills must operate at an average of 70 per cent in the second half of the year if tonnage is to go to 114 million and Iron Age says that 115 million tons is the absolute best that most hope for now.

The poor showing in steel in July—with a mounting number of workers laid off—is due largely to a steep drop in new orders since early spring, while steel users cut back on their stocks.

Adding to July's slowness will be the annual vacations in many steel using industries, who are expected to be back in the market again in August.

Auto companies are beginning to cut off output of 1960 models and the changeover period will be staggered into early fall.

Orders for auto steel are expected to pick up in August. But many other users, such as appliance makers, are holding up orders until a glut of products is sold. One appliance maker (Judson S. Sayre, chairman of Borg-Warner) looks for the heavy inventory of the home appliance industry to adjust itself within the next 60 to 90 days.

Railroads seem more interested in talking about mergers this month than in ordering steel. And oil men concentrate on how to reduce supplies and let ordering of new steel supplies for exploration slower than steelmen would like.
