

School Board Picks Andrews For New Post at \$12,400

Carl R. Andrews Monday night was appointed on probation as assistant superintendent of schools for instruction. He was administrative assistant to the superintendent of schools.

Mr. Andrews will be paid \$12,400 a year for the new position. His present salary was \$10,000.

In other action, Paul J. Kleiber, acting superintendent of schools, was granted a \$500 payment for increased administrative responsibilities through Dec. 31. His regular salary is \$12,400.

According to a statement given to the press concerning Mr. Andrews' appointment, he will be responsible for stimulating increased relations among all facets of the community particularly as they relate to the school system.

- He also will be responsible for:
 1. Providing guidance in updating of community participation in school system affairs;
 2. Coordination as the school system moves towards curriculum reorganization, development and improvement, institution of innovative activities, service and planning, improvement of existing plant facilities;
 3. Investigation and impetus to the application of federal and state funding to accomplish educational advantages for the educational establishment;
 4. Recruiting and assisting in the selection of qualified professional staff personnel;
 5. Utilizing staff and lay resources to assess needs, promote understanding, establish procedures and carry out continuing programs designed to improve the dimension of education in the district;
 6. Assist the superintendent with other assigned tasks.

Mr. Andrews, who was hired June 7, 1965, is completing 28 years of school administration and teaching. Prior to coming to Auburn, he spent nearly two years in Argentina as principal and assistant director of an Argentine school of 900 students in Buenos Aires.

From 1952 to 1965, he was chief school administrator of the Hannibal Central School and from 1948 to 1952, he held a similar position in the Bradford Central School in northern Steuben County.

Mr. Andrews' wife, Susie, is in charge of the secondary art program at West High School, and Miss Verma Green, a first grade teacher at Fulton School.

Miss Clara spoke about a new syllabus for language arts which will be implemented statewide in 1967. She said the syllabus was graded to the average learner. She said supplements for the slow learner and accelerated pupils are planned.

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The local program involves students enrolled in an approved sequence for a business diploma in the commercial educational department at Central High School.

Mr. Andrews also said the board had submitted proposals to the State Education Department requesting matching funds of about \$44,000 for programs under the National Defense Education Act (NDEA) of 1958.

Mr. Andrews graduated from Alfred University in 1938 and received a master's degree from Alfred in 1947. He is currently enrolled in a doctoral program at Syracuse University. He taught science and mathematics for 10 years before becoming an administrator.

He also is a member of the American Community Church of Buenos Aires; a former deacon, choir director and church school teacher of the Hannibal Community Church; member of the Hannibal Lodge F&AM; director of the Oswego County Health Association; Eagle Scout and Sea Scout unit leaders; National Jamboree Scoutmaster in 1957; member of the Oswego County School Council from 1960-63 and chairman of the leadership training committee.

The testing will involve kindergarten and seventh grade students.

The program will include an educational program with the actual testing, a follow-up of all positive reactors with an appointment at the Chest Clinic for x-ray for the person, his family and household contacts, and a periodic or yearly check on positive reactors.

There will be no cost to the student or his family since Christmas Seal contributions will furnish the supplies and the Health Department, County Medical Society or school will furnish the personnel, Mrs. Heath said.

Mrs. Lesch also read a letter from Mrs. Sara Ann Chilton, program chairman of the Central New York Special Education Conference, which was held Oct. 23 at Casey Park School.

Mrs. Chilton thanked the school board for use of the school, the staff, room mother service and substantial help.

Basic School Course Set For Adults

A citywide elementary adult basic education course will be offered by the Auburn Board of Education.

The course will be open to all school district residents who are out of school and have less than eighth grade education.

Funds for the program, which are administered by the State Department of Adult Basic Education, are expected within the next two weeks according to Carl Andrews, assistant superintendent of schools for instruction.

Funds for the program are available under the Economic Opportunity Act.

A similar course was held at West High School last year. At that time it was limited to welfare recipients. The course has now been expanded to the entire city.

Robert Murphy, commissioner of social welfare, wrote a letter to the board requesting continuation of the program for welfare recipients and extension of the course to all residents.

In other action, Paul J. Kleiber, acting superintendent of schools, reported that Thomas Petry, executive director of the Central New York Educational Television Council, will attend the Nov. 15 meeting of the board. He will speak regarding local television in aid for education.

Commissioner Robert B. Hole requested permission at the Oct. 18 meeting of the school board for Mr. Petry to attend.

Mrs. Gerard A. Lesch said surrounding school districts will be invited to the meeting which will be held in Council Chambers at Memorial City Hall. Mrs. Lesch said any person who was interested was invited to attend the meeting.

Mrs. Lesch expressed the sympathy of the school board to the family of Dr. Bernard L. Cullen of 127 S. Herman Ave., school doctor, who died Oct. 21.

Mrs. Lesch said Dr. Cullen's service has been "dedicated and devoted." She said many parents "sat comfortable in the stands knowing Dr. Cullen was available."

Mr. Kleiber publicly thanked members of the Oswego Volunteer Fire Department for cleaning up what he termed "Halloween vulgarities" on the sidewalk in front of Owasco Elementary School. He said the firemen volunteered to help with the clean up and the school board and the custodial staff expressed their appreciation. He said obscene language had been painted on the sidewalk.

Mr. Andrews reported that a workshop session for implementation of the library resources portion of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act would be held Wednesday morning at Casey Park School.

He said a meeting of the public-parochial school committee and others interested in the act would be held at 9 a.m. Wednesday at Casey Park. He said Peter Daly and Robert Parker of the State Education Department will attend the meeting.

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Policy Approved by Board For School Library Books

A policy concerning the selection of library books and materials for the enlarged school district was approved by the Auburn Board of Education Monday night.

The policy was distributed to the school board members at their last meeting for study.

According to the approved policy, the school board is legally responsible for the school library. The board and the administrators entrust the selection to the librarians.

The librarian, according to the policy, should seek the cooperation of the administrators, teachers and pupils in selecting the books and other materials.

If there is a difference of opinion concerning selection of library materials, the matter is to be submitted in writing to the school superintendent who will appoint a committee of faculty members to study the subject.

The decision of the faculty committee may be appealed through the superintendent to the Board of Education for final decision.

The basic principles in the selection of the library materials will be to:

- 1. Provide materials that will enrich and support the curriculum, taking into consideration the varied interests, abilities and maturity levels of the pupils served;
- 2. Provide a background of information which will enable pupils to make intelligent judgments in their daily life;
- 3. Provide materials that will stimulate growth in factual knowledge, literary appreciation, aesthetic values and ethical standards;
- 4. Provide material on opposing sides of controversial issues so that young citizens may develop under guidance the practice of critical reading and thinking;
- 5. Provide materials representing

tative of the many religious, ethnic, and cultural groups and their contribution to our American heritage.

Place principle above personal opinion, and reason above prejudice in the selection of materials of the highest quality in order to assure a comprehensive collection appropriate for the users of the library.

Voter Turnout in Auburn Area Said Heavy

Voter turnout in Auburn and surrounding towns seemed heavy at noon today, according to political observers.

Observers noted that by noon almost half of the voters in Owasco's second district and one-third of those in the third district of Ward 2 had voted.

They called this an "amazingly" high turnout for an off-year election.

The polls in Auburn and Cayuga County opened at 6 a.m. and will remain open through 9 tonight. After 9 election returns will be aired over radio station WMBO through the facilities of The Citizen-Advertiser.

At least one problem with a voting machine has been encountered so far. It concerned listing the wrong candidate.

In the second district of Ward 3, at the James St. Annex, the Democratic supervisor candidate was listed as John Schmidt instead of Ronald Oughterson. Mr. Schmidt is the Democratic Ward 2 supervisor candidate.

The error was corrected and the machines in Ward 2 were checked to make sure Mr. Oughterson was not listed on any of its machines. He was not.

In Auburn voters will choose two city councilmen from incumbent Republicans Arthur A. Karpinski, DDS and Thomas L. DeFurio, DDS, and Democratic challengers Peter E. Corning and Thomas F. McGee.

In state legislative contests Democratic incumbent Assemblyman George M. Michaels is attempting to defend his position against Republican challenger Joseph A. Rybanowicz while Democrat Francis J. Souhan and Republican Theodore D. Day are battling for a State Senate seat.

Besides voting for supervisors and town officers there are also three propositions, one question and nine amendments on the ballot.
