Today's top television shows are previewed and selected by TV KEY's staff of experts who attend rehearsals, watch screenings and analyze scripts in New York and Hollywood.

U.S. AMATEUR GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP. Live from the Broadmoor Golf Club in Colorado Springs, Colorado, the last three holes of the final round of the championship contest are covered in this hour-long special. Defending amateur champ is Gary Cowan, and commentators include Chris Schenckel, Bill Fleming, and Hall of Fame golfer Byron Nelson. (Color) 6:30 p.m. (9-13)

AWAY WE GO. The Great One returns next week to tonight's Hollywood-based variety bill bows out with Sheila MacRae's racy starring Sheila MacRae with Buddy Greco, belts out "San Francisco," and plays the wifes of Sitting Bull, Napoleon, and Noah in the main comedy sketch. George Carlin kids TV commercials. Buddy Greco has a love melody to sing, and The Teddy Bears' Five appear for two numbers. (Color) 7:30 p.m. (5-10)

MISSION: IMPOSSIBLE. (Repeat) A pulchritudinous action tale, in which the agents must prove to an ailing Premier that his successor plans to go Communist. The main first-rate production sequences built around a train trip are fine. (Color) 8:30 p.m. (5-10)

GET SMART. "A Man Called Smart." Part II. (Repeat) A funny show where once again the plot doesn't interfere with the routines. In this episode, comedy honors must go to William Schallert (playing opposite himself tonight) who portrays the Admiral in a celebrated 92-year-old spy, brought out of retirement to help CONTROL crack the case. (Color) 8:30 p.m. (5-8)

WORLD PREMIERE. "Tron-side." (Repeat) This two-hour advance look at Raymond Burr's new hour-long series, which premieres on Thursday, September 14th, was first shown last March. In case you missed him then, Burr plays a gruff, blunt, cantankerous sleuth confined to a wheelchair, crippled by a splinter's rifle bullet. Don Marlowe's script is ace, as we follow Burr recovering from his wound and tracking down his assailant, with the help of a suave dialogue by James Goldstone's staccato direction is noteworthy; but it's Burr's acting that dominates the show. PRO FOOTBALL. CBS offers another pre-season National Football League game on the network in prime time, tonight. It's the Cleveland Browns, from Municipal Stadium in Cleveland, with Ray Scott and Frank Gifford handling the commentary. 9:30 p.m. (5-10)

SCOPE. The Votes Are Cast. Tonight's report on the Vietnam and congressional election in South Vietnam, whose people went to the polls today. Six ABC correspondents in Vietnam for the election coverage will report on the voting in rural and urban areas; review the campaigns of the military and civilian candidates; and assess the meaning of the election and its results. (Color) 10:30 p.m. (13)

LOOK UP AND LIVE. "The Shrine of Lourdes." (Repeat) This short documentary study of the persistent belief in the curative powers of the Shrine in Lourdes, France, will interest not only believers, but all those who may remember the fascinating movie called "The Song of Bernadette," which dramatized the story of the origin of the Shrine. 10:30 p.m. (6-10)

CAMERA THREE. "The Rescue of Abu Simbel." (Repeat) The title refers to the huge temples of Ramses II of Egypt who ruled the land in the 13th century B.C. In order to save the temples from the swart, the temples were removed from the shores of the Nile River and photographed by William MacQuitty narrates the showing of the films he took of the hazardous dismantling and installation processes. 11 a.m. (5-10)

DISCOVERY. "Discovery Visits New York City." Part II. (Repeat) Let your children tune in for part two of this scenic tour of New York City. Kilpatrick of the Washington Star Syndicate, Marjorie Hunter of The New York Times, Jonathan M. Spivak of the Wall Street Journal, and Richard V. Evans of NBC News. Significantly, Commissioner Howe will be interviewed as schools across the country approach the opening of their fall semesters. (Color) 1 p.m. (8)

ISSUES AND ANSWERS. William Attwood, formerly U.S. Ambassador to two African nations, and Senator Eugene McCarthy, Democrat of Minnesota, will be interviewed on Africa and its problems by ABC correspondent Joseph C. Hirsch one week before ABC's four-hour special, "Africa," takes over its entire prime time schedule on Sunday, September 10th. (Color) 1:30 p.m. (9-13)

CABELING WORLD GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP. Live from the Toronto Board of Trade Golf final rounds of the \$200,000 Cabeling-World Golf Championship begins tonight. Defending champ Bruce Devlin heads the list of 150 international golfers participating in a one-day tournament. Commentators for the tele-

vision coverage are Jack Drees, Henry Longhurst, John Derr, Jay Randolph, Bruce Roberts and Cary Middlecott. (Color) 4:30 p.m. (5-10)

60s CENTURY. "The Mighty Atom." (Repeat) One of the most important factors of life in the 60s century and the next — atomic power — is explored concisely and knowledgeably in this half hour. Though the technical jargon may overwhelm the non-scientifically oriented, the implications of atomic use for good or evil in the next century cannot be passed off lightly. Illustrations of peaceful uses of atomic energy include experimental stages in radiating perishable foods; preservation; radioactive treatment of cancer; the building of artificial harbors; and a most interesting segment on the "breeder" reactor which converts rock into fuel. WALT DISNEY. "The Moon-Spinner." Part III. (Repeat) Adventure movie about stolen gems on the island of Crete. Includes in acceptable fashion, with young English NICKI (Hayley Mills) and friend Mark outsmarting wily jewel thief Stratos. The Crete festival and harbor scenes are effective, and so is silent movie star Pola Negri, appearing as the shady Madame Habib, buyer of stolen goods. (Color) 7:30 p.m. (5-8)

THE DOOR. (Repeat) The comedy acts. Ed has the opportunity to become a star. He is joined by George Carlin and a singing and banjo playing group called Your Father's Moustache. For songs, he's got Mel Tormé with "Bring Back Bop" and a pop tune melody; Enzo Stuart for the familiar operatic aria, "Vesti La Giubba"; and Gail Martin's "He Loves Me" and "Rose of Washington Square." The comedy act of the evening is a balancing act performed by Seven Siancas. (Color) 8 p.m. (5-10)

QUE PLACE. If you've enjoyed the lightweight antics of this summer variety show, tune in tonight for its closing hour. At the top of the list of recommended segments, here's Arthur Godfrey's guest appearance singing with the Doodletown boys, and the Muppet dog "Rowlf." Also diverting are comedy sketches by Burns and Schreiber about a lesson in pandering among others. (Color) 9 p.m. (10)

MONAZZA. "Judgment at Red Creek." (Repeat) Good episode. An "Ox Bow Incident" type plot, a western staple, with little Joe acting on behalf of justice, and guest star John Ireland anxious to kill both suspects. Since justice always triumphs on family westerns, the outcome is never really in doubt, but it's well played and absorbing. (Color) 9 p.m. (3-8)

SUNDAY NIGHT MOVIE. "The Sheepman." (1958) (Repeat) Fast and funny western about a sheepman who saves a town plot and keeps the comedy predominating. Glenn Ford gives a wood account of himself as the stubborn sheepman who won't listen to the demands of the cattlemen, and Shirley MacLaine is fine as his romantic vis-a-vis. (Color) 9 p.m. (9-13)

WHAT'S MY LINE? Fans, don't miss the final show of this CBS series, which closes down its curtain on TV and a half year of Sunday night appearances. Just to tug at your memory, there'll be a film clip of how John Daly introducing its opening shot on February 2, 1960. Veterans of the show's long run, Bertel and Arlene Francis, semi-veteran Steve Allen and frequent guest Martin Gable make up the panel for tonight, and John Daly, the program's only host, will be at his post to the last. LEON ROSS. "The Red Toronado." (Repeat) Interesting Indian episode. Ben Dale Robertson falls heir to an eight-year-old Arapaho, sole survivor of a raiding party. Trouble erupts when the Shoshones, mortal enemies of the Arapahos, threaten violence upon the latter's hands over to them. Building Permits

4 Building Permits Issued Totalling \$1,920 in Auburn

Only four building permits were issued during the past week by building Inspector Richard G. Dragone as the improvement work in the city starts its annual drop after a busy summer season. The permits bring the total for the year to 43, 13 less than the same time last year, and the total value of the work was estimated at \$1,920.

Raymond S. Wethey was given permission to remodel the basement at 3 Grover St. into an apartment at a cost of \$1,500. James Ramage was issued a permit to reroof 55 Clark St. at a cost of \$320. A Joseph Costello of 9 Myrtle Ave. and Allen E. Delaney of 17 Capitol St. will demolish garages on their properties with each project costing \$50.

(Editor's Note: The property transfers listed below are copied from deeds filed in the county clerk's office. Assessments are taken from the city assessor's office or the county treasurer's office. The equalization rate is the same as that used by the county for the spreading of county taxes.

(Equalization rates set by the state indicate the difference between a community's assessment and what the state considers the true (market) value of the property.

(The assessment of a property that sells for \$20,000 will vary in different townships according to the equalization rate. Where the rate is 50 (Auburn's rate is 50) the assessment probably should be roughly half, or \$10,000. Where the rate is 37 (Victory) the assessment probably should be roughly one-third, or about \$7,000. Where the rate is 25 (Throop) the assessment probably should be about a quarter of real value, or \$5,000.

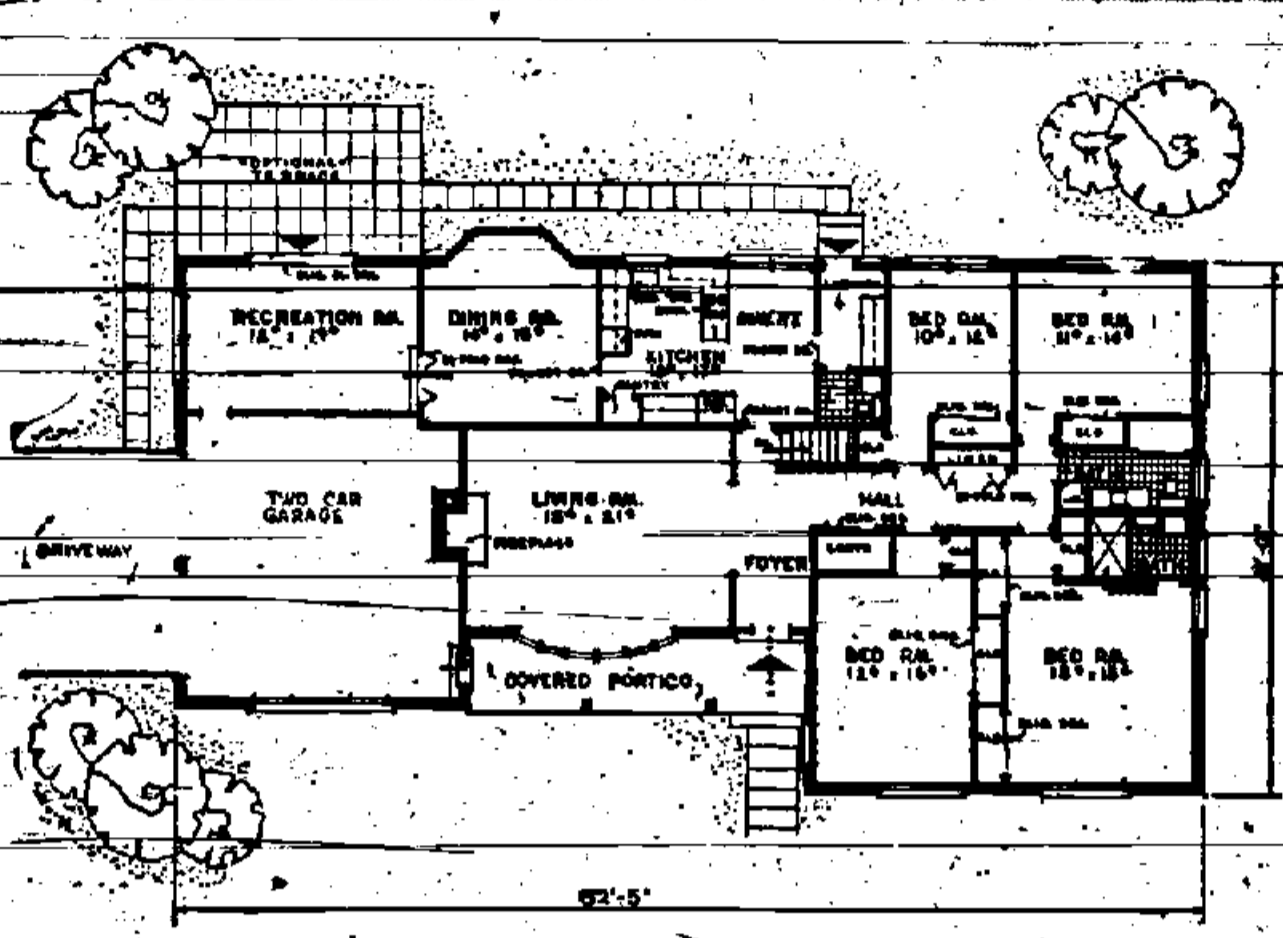
