A six-game pre-season schedule has been announced by the Buffalo Bills. Buffalo will meet New Orleans, Green Bay and Cleveland at Rich Stadium in Buffalo. Away games are at Detroit, Cincinnati and Los Angeles.

The regular season schedule has Buffalo opening at home against Miami on Monday night, Sept. 13. Six days later the Bills play host to Houston on Sunday, Sept. 19.

Other home games will be against Kansas City Chiefs on Oct. 3; Baltimore Colts, Oct. 17; New England Patriots, Oct. 24; New York Jets, Oct. 31; San Diego Chargers, Nov. 21.

With the exception of the Monday night opener against the Dolphins, all home games will be at 1 p.m. The night TV game will start at 9 p.m. Six of Buffalo's first eight games will be at home and five of the final six games will be on the road. The Bills were 5-2 in away games a year ago and 3-4 at home.

Tony Trabert, captain of the United State Davis Cup team, has been named chairman of National Tennis Week. The nationwide event encouraging participation in the game will be celebrated at over 500 tennis sites across the country during the week of June 19-27.

The Ed Kolo family, who became close friends of catcher Bill Nahorodny when he broke into professional baseball with Auburn, received a phone this past week from Bill's parents, with the good news that Bill got married last week. Bill is off to a great start with Oklahoma City of the American Association. He rapped home runs in the first two days of the season for Phillies' Triple A club. Keep the date of Sept. 11 open. Famous softball pitcher Eddie Feigner and his four-man team will perform at Falcon Park under the sponsorship of the Auburn ball club of the NY-P League. Booked as one of the greatest softball pitchers of all time, Feigner was a big hit here two years when he packed the local ball orchard for an exhibition against a Auburn All-Star team. Bill DeMars, third base coach for the Phillies, was given credit by slugger Mike Schmidt for his sudden rash of home runs, including four in one game

in Chicago. DeMars, a Rochester resident and a guest speaker at Auburn's last Hot Stove League banquet, had Mike working with a batting tee prior to the series in Wrigley Field. "It really help me overcome the problem of keeping my eye on the ball," the hard hitting third baseman said. The Designated Hitter rule will be used in 19 out of 20 minor leagues this season. The only league not voting to employ the rule this season is the Class AAA American Association. The NY-P League will conduct its final league meeting before the season opens on Sunday, May 23 in Geneva. The league will swing into action on Tuesday, June 22 with Auburn at Newark. The same two teams play here the next night. Rochester, plagued by bad weather for the past week, postponed its home opener until May 8. Meanwhile Manager Joe Altobelli has taken his Red Wings to Tidewater, Va. for three exhibition games.

She set a world marathon record (26 miles) recently when she ran the event in two hours, 38 minutes and 19 seconds. She is the first woman ever to run 26 miles under 2:40. She is 5 feet, 2 1/2 inches and weighs 105 pounds. She runs 80 to 100 miles every week. Only five years ago, the best any woman could do in the marathon was three hours.

the strong righthander of the Corcoran Cougars, clashed in the battle with the latter coming out the winner 1-0.

However, Hendershot could not really be considered the loser as a run in the bottom of the seventh halted the game from going all night in the Syracuse north side ball orchard.

Both hurlers came into the game without giving up a run in CNY competition and matched six innings of goose eggs prior to the tally. Both gave up just two hits and struck out nine as they silenced the opponent's bats most of the night in near complete domination.

Only five batters stroked the ball into the outfield all night as Harmatuk retired the last 16 Maroons in order.

In the bottom of the seventh, Nicky Valentino scored the winning run from second base on an infield out which saw Hendershot sprawled beyond first after covering the bag for the put out.

Valentino was in the lineup as the designated hitter and led off the seventh with a line single. He moved up on a sacrifice by Joe Capriotti then when Mike Burgess grounded to first baseman Chuck Bouley, Valentino never hesitated at third, coming all the way home.

Hendershot covered first on the play and became tangled up with Burgess, some questioning the latter's interference on the play. Off balance, Hendershot fired to catcher Bernie Loperfido as he was falling to the ground only to miss Valentino.

Only 49 batters, seven over the minimum, came to the plate in the contest.

The Maroons really had no chance against the power of Christian Brothers Academy which is expected to roll through the Central New York Cities Conference once more with no problem.

The end result had the locals blasted 117-24. However, Bishop Grimes competed on a non-league basis and AHS was able to edge the Cobras 73-68.

Once more Jesse Clay stood out for the Lake Avenue school when he posted the double win in the sprints which has been become expected of him. He sprinted the 100 in 11 seconds flat and the 200 in 23.5 seconds, the same time as Brendan Jackson of the Brothers but Clay was adjudged the winner by judges.

Joe Fiore was the only other winner in the CBA meet, taking the long jump with a leap of 18-feet, 9-inches.

The Grimes meet wound up being a depth contest with Auburn having the best of it.

Of course Clay had a double win again while Fiore also pitched in with a double victory, adding the triple jump to his long jump win with a distance of 41-feet, 4-inches.

Pat Cullen came in first for the Maroons in the gruelling two-mile run with a time of 10:39 while AHS captured two other field events, Dan Sperndli being the tops in the shot put with a toss of 44-feet, 6-inches and Lorenzo Lewis taking the high jump in 5-feet, 10-inches.

The latter was somewhat disappointed after setting a new AHS standard the day previous with a jump of 6-2/2.

Auburn's mile relay team of Tim Littlefield, John Charles, Lewis and Pat

O'Grady also pulled out a win in the BG meet.

For CBA, Jackson set the lowest time of the season in the area in the 440 with a time of 42 seconds flat. Tim Herlosky gained a double for the Brothers by taking both

John Hillenbrand took the triple jump, Pete Rickert the two-mile in a fine time of 9:45.2 and Jim Lloyd went 12-7 in the pole vault.
